Mrs. F. R. Wetherbee was hostess for the Congregational Ladies' Aid society at her home Tuesday afternoon.

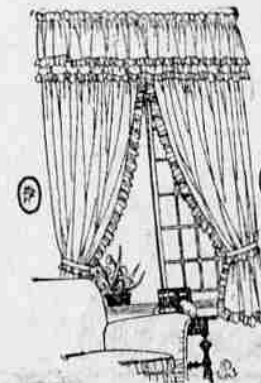

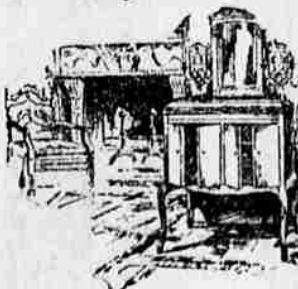
