Boyish Costume of Last Season Has Become Girlish One of This and Effects Generally Are Charming to Behold

NEW YORK, April 11.—By Easter, spring fashions have become definitely crystallized, the general trends of fashion have been established and the grand orgy of buying has begun.

The boyish costume of last season has become the girlish one of this—that is the outstanding feature of this year's Easter fashion parade.

The narrow neckline has given way to one very much fuller with motion and ripple, produced by ruffles, godets, plaits and insets, but otherwise the straight silhouette prevails. Without in the least suggesting tightness, clothes seem to be molded to the body.

Skirts Are Shorter  
Skirts are short and getting shorter.

As they grow shorter they become fuller, and there is a tendency to concentrate the trimming on the skirt.

Sleeves are long. Only on sport dresses and those intended for evening wear do we find the sleeve omitted. Elbow length and three-quarter length sleeves are infrequently seen.

The neckline hugs the neck and in many cases there is a collar—not the old-fashioned sort that continued from the neck, but one worn separately with the bateau or oval line. Scarfs are tied closely about the throat, and usually a part of the costume carrying out a definite scheme of decoration.

Ensemble Carried Out  
The ensemble idea is carried out in all types of clothes from sport to the evening gown. The most popular

type is the figured silk dress with cloth coat lined with the silk of the dress.

For sport wear one finds combinations of plain and striped or checked materials, and wool coats matching in color the silk sport frocks.

For afternoon wear, the ensemble is often of silk, of the ribbed variety such as faille, bouillonne or Otoman, with embroidery or beading of sequins on dress and coat. The ensemble of chiffon or georgette crepe in delicate colors banded with fur at the hemline of the coat is most lively. Taffeta coats or crepes match the figured chiffon dance frocks with which they are worn. Fur, ostrich feathers, velvet flowers and fringe are favorite finishes for the hems of these creations.
