LONDON, April 11.—(AP)—Ten years ago a young man offered himself to the Baptist Missionary Society for service as a missionary in the Congo. The applicant was rejected by a doctor, and subsequently went into business with the determination to devote his profits to the same he had hoped to serve in another way. It was announced recently that in the ten years since his rejection his gifts to the society have amounted to \$125,000.

Mail Carriers in England Wearied

LONDON, April 11.—(AP)—Climbing and descending steps for seven hours a day, carrying a load of 35 pounds, is the lot of the average London mail carrier in certain districts, according to a recent investigation, and in Glasgow postmen in the tenement sections of the city climb 3000 steps a day. This is regarded as too much, and the postal workers will propose that the load be limited to 28 pounds and the daily distance to 17 miles. A notable increase in stair climbing has come about through the building of more flat houses and the conversion of large dwellings into living quarters for small families.

OSLO, Norway, April 11.—(AP)—Norwegian delegates to the meeting of the International Council of Women, to be held in Washington May 4-14, will sail shortly on the steamer Stavangerfjord for Halifax, under the leadership of Mrs. Peter Kjetilberg, chairman of the Norwegian branch of the organization. They will make a short stop of eastern Canada before proceeding to the United States.

Loyalty to Great Ideal and to Whole Institution Held to Be Test of Man's Character in Many Cases



themselves to speak disparagingly of patriotism, because often men in high places have made it a cloak for their own selfish schemes and purposes. In fact, so debauched and disloyal is that the great Dr. Johnson said ironically that "patriotism was the last refuge of a scoundrel."

Text: Acts 3:1-11 Now Peter and John went up together into the temple at the hour of prayer, being the ninth hour. And a certain man lame from his mother's womb was carried, whom they laid daily at the gate of the temple which is called Beautiful, to ask alms of them that entered into the temple. Who, seeing Peter and John about to go into the temple, asked an alms. And Peter, fastening his eyes upon him with John, said, Look on us. And he gave heed unto them, expecting to receive something of them. Then Peter said, Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee: in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk. And he took him by the right hand and lifted him up; and immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength. And he leaping up stood, and walked, and entered with them into the temple, walking and leaping and praising God. And all the people saw him walking and praising God. And they knew that it was he which sat for alms at the Beautiful gate of the temple; and they were filled with wonder and amazement at that which had happened unto him. And as the lame man which was healed held Peter and John, all the people ran together unto them in the porch that is called Solomon's, greatly wondering.

whose dignity and hypocrisy degraded themselves. They preserved their own purity of motive and vision, and they went to the temple to pray? Is for faith like that, that enables us to do our duty, and follow the highest, and see in lofty symbols pure and rich meaning, even when others perceive holy places and things with their own blindness and weakness of soul? This example of Peter and John should not lose its significance for us. Then note, too, that it was Peter and John who were going up together. Not John and James, the brothers in ambition and rivalry for the first place in the kingdom. Peter had had his ideas about the foremost place. Though all should have denied Christ, he was quite sure of himself. And at the last, when Jesus had suggested to Peter what was to become of him, he had not been quite content; he had wanted to know what was going to happen to John (John 21:21-22). Yet here were these two, purged of their selfish ambitions, joined of all hearts against those who had slain their Lord, going up into the temple together to pray. If miracles could happen it would surely be under circumstances like this. But there was something more. There was the spirit of complete renunciation, and the supreme readiness to serve. It is too much to say that miracles always do happen when these conditions are fulfilled? Here was this poor cripple, looking uncleanly at Peter and John, as they stepped to his plea for alms. Your Easter Duty (A Message from St. Mary's Catholic Church, Eugene) Very early in the morning the first day of the week, they came to the sepulchre, the sun being now risen. And entering into the sepulchre they saw a young man sitting on the right side, clothed with a white robe; and they were astonished. Who smit to them; Be not affrighted; you seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified; HE IS RISEN, he is not here, behold the place where they laid him. Mark XVI, 2, 5, 6. The events of the first Easter morn, though ancient are ever new. Today as of old the world must learn the mystery of life from the Risen Christ. Like the Galileans at the dawn of the resurrection morning, we are privileged to explore the empty tomb. No one may plead indifference in this all important concern. No one is entitled to stand apart and observe with idle curiosity the Christian multitude on Easter morning. At least one visit the sincere mind must pay to the sepulchre to learn what befell there on the third day. The issue is critical for the souls of men. In the words of St. Paul: If Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain and your faith is also vain. But if Christ be indeed risen He will come in the majesty of His Father and be a stern judge to those who have not sought Him a merciful Saviour. No cheap dilettante emotionalism will be accepted as a substitute for faith in Christ. "Religion is all or nothing. 'Tis no mere smile of contentment, or sigh of aspiration; no quality of the finer tempered clay like its whiteness or its lightness; it is life of very life." The human soul is a priceless gem set between time and eternity, and though it can not be weighed in the chemist's scales, it outweighs in worth and dignity and importance all the material universe beside.
