

INFORMATION ON FLAX GROWING IS GIVEN BY EXPERT

Information on the planting of flax in Lane county and advice as to proper soils and other data on the experiment have been received at the office of O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent.

The following letter has been received from G. R. Hyslop, professor of farm crops at the Oregon Agricultural college:

"I hope that it will be possible for you to get these acres on soils that are medium to slightly heavy in texture, rather than the very light sandy or gravelly soil types. Also, the strictly heavier soil types should be avoided. There is a great deal of very good soil in the Long Tom bottom, and in the prairies where it is, not too white and too poor that should make fairly good flax land.

EXECUTIVE POWER OF PRESIDENT IS INVOLVED IN CASE

WASHINGTON, April 13.—The president's power to remove from office his own or his predecessors' appointees was at issue in a case reached for argument today in the supreme court, with the executive and legislative branches of the government represented as contestants.

The case became one for construction by the highest court of the president's power under the constitution to remove executive appointees to offices created by congress when the senate intervened in the appeal of the late Frank S. Myers, who was removed as postmaster at Portland, Ore., in 1920 by President Wilson.
