

WATER BOARD HAS APPEAL FOR BONDS

The water would have to be filtered just the same. The pressure would not put it up to the reservoirs and would be too high for the settling tanks. Hendricks bridge is also off the most direct route on up the river.

The point selected for an intake is at the elevation necessary to put water by gravity to the present filter. It was necessary to cross the river at Hayden bridge to go beyond the first big bend to get the required elevation and avoid excessive depth of trench. The route selected is the shortest practical to the selected intake.

Points Are Listed

"The intake above Hayden bridge has the following points in its favor:

1. It is the nearest point on the McKenzie offering a marked improvement over the present supply.
2. It is on a direct route to the upper McKenzie.
3. The same size of pipe used to Hayden bridge will, if extended beyond it, put the same amount of water to the reservoirs.
4. The river can be crossed in a rock formation, where the channel is fixed, no matter what changes may take place above and below; stability of banks is the exact reason for the selected crossing and intake.
5. Enough water for double our present population can be delivered to the present filter plant by gravity.
6. Enough water for 50,000 to 60,000 population can be delivered by gravity when settling tanks are lowered.
7. By adding pumps, a population of 100,000 can be served by this pipe line.
8. The growth of Eugene can thus be cared for by steps as it occurs up to a time when this pipe is worn out or the population justifies going farther up the river.
9. By going to Hayden bridge we will get a water practically free from dangerous pollution. While our present water is made safe by filtration, a better raw water will make filtration less difficult.
10. The low water flow of the McKenzie is from 2 to 3 times that in the Willamette.
11. The Hayden bridge project is the only one that could possibly be financed by revenue from sale of water. Any other would mean a tax to pay interest and depreciation.
12. To go any farther up the river would be useless unless far enough to get above all danger of pollution. Pumping is shown to be a much less costly way than gravity to get pressure.

Engineer Employed.

"In order to check the board's engineers and make sure that the project is feasible and reasonable, and the best possible under the limitations of cost permissible, a consulting engineer of wide experience in water supply work has been engaged to report on the project.

We realize that these projects entail increased operating costs in the water department, which will have to be met by increased water rates in case the improvements are authorized. We will be charged with the responsibility of putting in effect the increased rates and may even be criticized for such increases.

"We would gladly avoid these responsibilities but feel that both these projects are timely and justified, and are for the best interest of the City of Eugene, and we each individually favor them and are willing to assume the obligations mentioned above.

"We have made no campaign for these projects but consider the McKenzie future and have tried, through our engineers, to present fairly and impartially, the facts as we see them.

"If a majority say by their vote that they are satisfied with the present supply, we will continue to do our best with the means at hand, in order that Eugene may have safe water in the future in the past. We seek the decision of the people and urge that everybody vote either for or against the proposal in order that the decision may be clear, one way or the other."

GENERAL ANDREWS IS A FIGHTER

Two-Fisted Soldier Takes Charge of Prohibition Enforcement in The United States; Reputation is Strong

WASHINGTON, April 11.—A two-fisted soldier has been entrusted with the gigantic task of enforcing the prohibition law.

General Lincoln C. Andrews, assistant secretary of the treasury, is especially in charge of the job of drying up the country.

With a reputation for strenuousness much like that of General Snedley D. Butler of the marine corps, who has been fighting the sale of liquor in Philadelphia, it is believed that Andrews will put booze into discard, if any one can.

Andrews is a West Pointer, who spent most of his army life as a cavalryman and served as deputy provost marshal general at American C. H. Q. in France.

He knows police work and has proved himself a capable executive through his connections as head of the New York transit commission and receiver of the New York and Queens County railroads.

He has an amiable disposition and is typically lean, elderly cavalryman, with a firm jaw and piercing eyes, molded into a countenance that spells self-assurance.

Andrews carries the air of a leader, who turns aside all barriers to reach his object.

Under President Coolidge's latest policy the new assistant secretary will be relieved of the task of chasing retail bootleggers.

His job is to stop the supply of liquor at its source. If retailers do manage to obtain any, they may peddle it to their heart's content, so far as the federal government is concerned.

Arresting bootleggers will have to be attended to by local authorities, the president says—federal agents can not be expected to carry on petty police work.

Weapons placed at General Andrews' disposal are the coast guard, the customs service and the prohibition unit.

With the coast guard the general will endeavor to stop the landing of liquor on the shores of the United States.

Custom service officials will try to prevent smuggling across the Canadian and Mexican borders.

Prohibition units will seek to break up moonshining and illicit withdrawals from liquor warehouses.

If prohibition can't be enforced by General Andrews, it can't be enforced by anybody—at least that is the opinion prevailing in official Washington.

Police Armed to Put Down Yeggs

DUBLIN, April 13. —(AP)—When the Free State abolished the Royal Irish Constabulary, a semi-military force, and established its new police, the Garda Siochana, it was decided that the new police should be unarmed. The men carry no weapon but a baton.

LAST CARLOAD OF BROCCOLI SHIPPED

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 13.—The last carload of broccoli to be shipped this season went out from Riddle today, and with the exception of a few small express shipments as the late crop continues ripening, it is thought there will be no more carload shipments, as it took four days to gather enough for the final car.

The shipment moved Saturday makes the 63d carload for the season, all except one being shipped out of Myrtle Creek and Riddle, the one section of the county where the cold weather of December did not completely kill the crop.

The growers have been very good, local exchanges report, crates selling for amounts ranging from \$1.15 to \$1.75 a crate.

In spite of severe losses this year, the prospects are that more broccoli will be planted during the coming summer and that even before shipping associations report that their members are arranging large plantings this year and that under normal conditions there will be more broccoli shipped out of the Umpqua valley next spring than ever before.

Growers are putting great hopes in the accidental discovery made this spring, that the application of acid phosphate instead of a cold desiccating quality. Although tests to definitely prove the powers of the chemical fertilizer have not yet been made, many growers are putting use of the chemical on their land in the hope that another freeze will not cause such great damage. Plans have been made by experts for extensive tests during the coming winter to determine the effects of acid phosphate on crops in cold sections.

Lawsuit Settled After 300 Years

PRAGUE, April 13.—(AP)—A lawsuit concerning a large tract of standing timber which was begun 300 years ago has been settled. It was announced recently. The land in question was formerly claimed by the wealthy family of Schoenborn, of Velke Luty.

As a result of a compromise, part of the forest acreage is to be sold for the benefit of the Ruthenian peasants of the district, while some 4,000 acres are awarded to the Schoenborn heirs who have been fighting the case through the various courts all these years.
