Travel to be Heavy— Ocean voyages to Europe and the Orient, as well as eastern vacation trips will be unusually heavy from Eugene this summer, predicts F. S. Appelmann, passenger agent of the Oregon Electric. Our low summer excursion rates become effective May 22," says Mr. Appelmann, "and judging from the advance inquiries we are receiving, this will be the biggest year for travel we have ever had. Round trip fares to eastern points will average about the same as last year—about one and one-half the regular fare."
