

WOMEN STUDENTS TO CONVEENE HERE

The third biennial national convention of the Associated Women Students will open here tomorrow morning, with registration from 8:30 to 10, and the first business session from 10 to 12. Delegates will probably be arriving during this afternoon, however, and will be registered at once.

Directories, with the name of the delegate, the school she represents, and where she is staying on the campus, will be posted in the phone booth of each women's organization, so that inquiries may be easily answered.

Forty-four schools will be represented at this conference, including most of the universities and colleges west of the Appalachian mountains. Many of the institutions sending two or three girls.

Tomorrow evening, a dinner will be given in the Women's building, and will be followed by "Stunt Night," similar in character to the April Fools, although those attending will not be in costume. Any university women who wish to attend this program are extended a cordial invitation. Sentiment for the whole week is to make the delegates feel as much at home as possible, and the welcoming committee urges everyone on the campus to renew the Oregon "Hello," especially for the guests.

Problems Proposed
Among the problems to be discussed at the business sessions of the conference will be the place of the W. S. G. A. on the campus, extra-curricular activities, vocational guidance, scholarship standards and honor systems, and round-table discussions, including the dormitoryless campus, small-college problems, pan-hellenic questions, and student indifference.

VISITING TEACHER TO BE RETAINED

Work of the visiting teacher will be continued in Eugene schools next year, the school board decided at its meeting last night. After action taken by local organizations in favor of continuing this service in the schools, the board reversed its previous action abolishing the appropriation for the visiting teacher.

Chadwick C. Newhouse of Frances Willard junior high school, turned in his resignation, which was accepted, and his position will be filled by adding quarter time to Mrs. Lucresia Bensfield, now a half-time teacher, and by election of Ed Kirtley as three quarter time teacher.

September 12 was set as the date for opening the fall term of school. The board demonstrated strongly against the raising of rent by the city council from \$10 to \$20.

Contracts offered to teachers must be accepted or rejected by the next board meeting, April 27, it was declared. A year's leave of absence was granted to Grace Knapp, head of the Spanish department, to study in Spain. Committees named were as follows: For a tennis court for Eugene high school, W. A. Elkins, W. E. Reed and C. W. Mullins.

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COUNCIL APPROVES CITY COMMISSION

The city planning commission idea was given unqualified endorsement of the Eugene city council at its meeting last night, and the ordinance governing the project passed its first reading by that body. The resolution and ordinance were presented by Miss Morelle Blair, acting president of the Eugene Federation of Women's clubs, and Frank Chambers, president of the chamber of commerce.

George W. Reed was granted the contract for paving Third avenue west from Blair boulevard to Monroe street, for \$11,143.45.

No action was taken on the proposal to re-establish the appropriation for the United States employment office here, as no petition was presented. The council decided to await the petition before taking action.

Sevens running under the two new junior high schools will be abandoned as a health measure, the council decided. The sevens will be changed to run around the school grounds.

Whether a city permit was necessary to have rifle practice in the basement of Eugene high school was a question asked by C. W. Main, member of the school board, and it was decided an ordinance would be drawn up to cover this case.
