

SALE OF DOLLAR SHIPS ASKED BY SENATOR McNARY

WASHINGTON, April 15.—A suggestion that the Dollar interests be required to purchase the vessels they now are operating for the shipping board was made to President Coolidge today by Senator McNary, republican, Oregon. If this should be done, Senator McNary is of the opinion that there would be removed much of the basis of criticism of the action of the board in selling to the Dollar interests the five president-type ships now operated by a competitor, the Pacific Mail Steamship company.

The three commissioners who dissented to the sale of five ships to the Dollar interests—Captain Plummer, Thompson and Benson—will file separate answers in the District of Columbia supreme court in the injunction proceedings brought by the Pacific Mail to prevent consummation of the sale.

They began preparations of their answers today after the board by a vote of 4 to 3 had refused to permit them use of lawyers in the legal department of the board to act for them in making appearance and filing affidavits with the court.

The vote was on the same lines as that by which the sale was originally authorized.

SCHOOL SALARIES CHANGED BY BOARD

Adjustments in salaries paid executive heads and teachers in Eugene's school system, announced by the board, were necessitated to make the salaries conform to the average paid by schools in other cities of Eugene's size throughout the state, it is announced. Several small reductions have been made, as well as increases.

The salary to be paid David Jones, new city school superintendent, will be \$3400 a year, while the present school year Joseph T. Glenn, retiring superintendent, was paid \$3600.

P. E. Christensen, principal of Eugene high school, will receive \$2400 a year, as compared with \$2750 received by the retiring principal. This was the result of removing the ninth grade pupils from the high school to the new Roosevelt and Wilson junior high schools.

Heads of departments at Eugene high school will receive a uniform scale of \$1650, it was decided. This will be a reduction in some cases, as Earl "Spike" Leslie has been receiving \$2200, and C. C. Stone, head of the commercial department, \$1800.

In grade schools the minimum salary for principals is \$1050, excepting in the Geary school, where E. R. Parker will receive \$1800, because of the size of the school and his tenure of office.

Stanley D. Eaton, principal of the new Woodrow Wilson junior high, with 22 rooms, will receive \$2100, and Miss Margaret Halvorsen, principal of Theodore Roosevelt junior high, \$1800. This school has 12 rooms.

In grade schools the minimum for teachers is \$1035, as compared to \$1125 last year. In the high school the minimum was raised from \$1125 to \$1200 a year, and the maximum from \$1350 to \$1400.

Other salaries announced include assistant physical director for boys in grade schools, \$1385; physical director for girls at high school, \$1050; assistant physical director for girls in grade schools, \$1305; shop instructor at high school, \$2100; assistant shop instructor at high school, \$1500; shop instructor in grades, \$1000; sewing teacher in grade schools, \$1000; school nurse, \$1350.

The program of the day will begin at Eugene at 8:00 o'clock a. m., when all members and candidates will assemble at the parish hall and go to Mass and Communion in a body. After breakfast everyone will again assemble at the church. The cars will start for the Albany K. of P. hall at 10 o'clock.

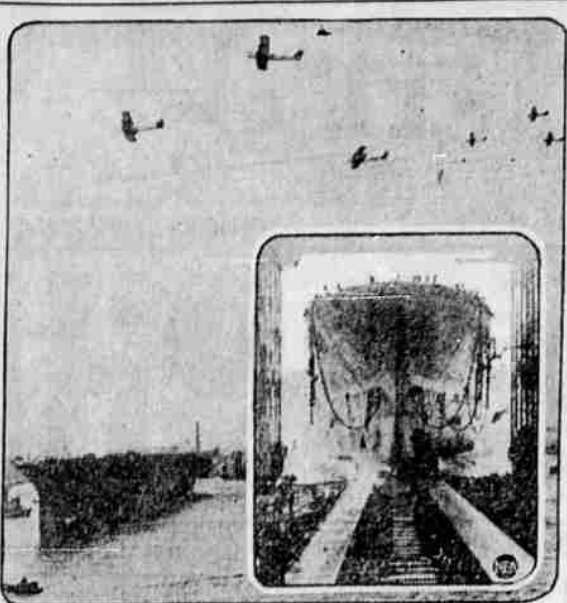

The U. S. S. Saratoga is shown just after her launching at Camden, N. J., with the airplanes for whom she is to be a mother ship flying overhead in greeting. Inset shows her as she left the ways. The Saratoga is the longest naval vessel in the world with a length of 888 feet, beam 105 feet and 74 feet deep, displacing 35,000 tons. Six great electric motors developing 180,000 h. p., enough energy to supply a city of 1,000,000, will drive her by means of six great propellers at a speed of 33 knots per hour. She is capable of handling 72 airplanes, which can be repaired and refueled, and then take off and land on her spacious decks.

HEAVY SENTENCE HANDED DOWN TO MAKER OF LIQUOR

SALEM, Ore., April 15.—Justice of the Peace Small today sentenced H. L. Wells to six months in the county jail and fined him \$500 in addition, while James Williams and Lawrence Montgomery, said to be co-partners of Wells, both pleaded not guilty and their bail was fixed at \$1,000 each. Wells pleaded guilty to the charge of manufacturing liquor.

The three men were arrested yesterday by William H. Levens, state prohibition commissioner, George Harburt, a federal agent and Roy Bremner, a Marion county deputy sheriff. Levens filed the complaint.

Following the arrest of the three, confiscation of their 100 gallon still and their imprisonment in the county jail, the vicinity of the still was searched and 30 gallons of moonshine was found in the brush.

Williams and Montgomery asked for a jury trial in justice court, and this will be held next Wednesday.

Prohibition officers alleged the men under arrest had operated from Woodburn, in Marion county, to as far south as Roseburg.

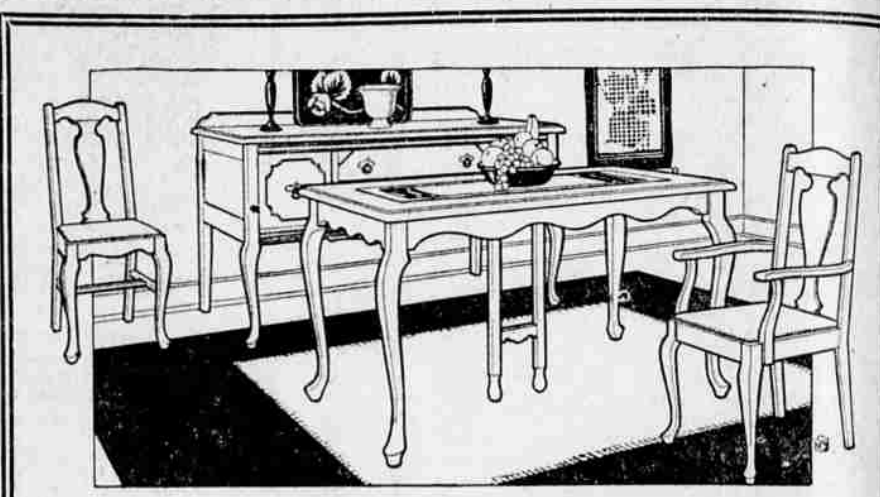
