Duluth Second in Maritime Activity

DULUTH, Minn., April 15.—(Special)—Although its trade has closed approximately four months of the year by ice, Duluth is rated the second largest cargo-shipping port of the nation in the annual report of maritime commerce of the Duluth-Superior harbor, issued here under direction of Major E. H. Marks, of the U. S. engineer's office.

New York harbor only had more shipping than Duluth last year, and Los Angeles was third, according to the report. Then came Buffalo, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Ashabula, O., and Boston Harbor, Mass.

Cargo freight, with a value of \$510,837,517 in 45,410,956 tons, for a season of 238 days, was recorded for this harbor.

The net registered tonnage of the 8933 cargo vessels which entered and left the harbor during the season was placed at 87,073,722 tons, while the total number of vessels of all classes to enter and leave the port was 9783.

William F. McClaren Dies at Hospital

William F. McClaren, 50, died yesterday afternoon at the Mercy hospital. He leaves a son, James F. McClaren of Portland, and a number of cousins in Eugene and Portland.

Mr. McClaren was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. James McClaren, pioneer residents of Eugene. Mr. McClaren was the only heir to a large estate, consisting of property adjoining the Southern Pacific yards in the northwest part of the city. He has lived in Eugene all his life, and attended schools here.

Funeral services will be held at the Veatch chapel Thursday at 10:30 a. m., with interment in the Masonic cemetery.
