

EARLY DECISION ON EUGENE BOND CASE BY COURT IS ASKED

Application to have the Eugene bond case now pending in the state supreme court set ahead on the calendar in order that a decision may be obtained in the near future will be made today by L. E. Bean who with O. H. Foster is representing the city of Eugene and the regents of the University of Oregon as defendants in the case. Mr. Bean is leaving for Salem this afternoon. The case is now ready for trial and the application for an immediate action will be based on the fact that the matter is of public importance and that in addition to the auditorium bond issue of \$500,000 there are also included the fire apparatus bond issue and the street intersection bonds. The latter issue is not involved now as it was re-passed by vote of the people here yesterday.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., April 16.—Taking suddenly ill from an attack of blood poisoning late yesterday afternoon, Charles A. Bell, 65, and 40 years a resident of Hood River, died soon after being taken to a hospital here. He did not regain consciousness and physicians said they are unable to determine the cause of his sudden demise.

Mr. Bell was a native of New Brunswick, Canada, and was proprietor of the Mount Hood hotel here. He is survived by his widow, one son, Fred H. Bell of Hood River, a brother George A. Bell, and one sister, Mrs. Kate Young, both of whom reside at New Brunswick. Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon.
