

WATER BONDS OF CITY ARE PASSED

paring the vote cast yesterday on the proposal with the vote last July, when the auditorium bonds also were voted. The bonds at that time were approved by a majority of 502 voters. Yesterday they failed by 61 votes. The vote last year was 1293 for the bonds and 791 against.

Yesterday's election brought out a total of 2308 voters in the four polling places, approximately 47 per cent of the registered voters of Eugene. This is the heaviest vote at any board election in the history of the city, according to city officials.
