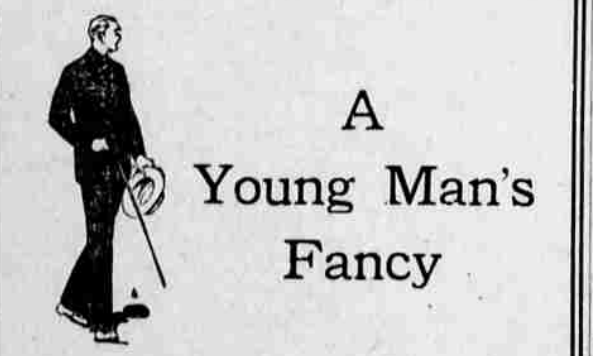
Mrs. J. H. Koke will entertain Domestic Art club members at her home on Monday afternoon.
