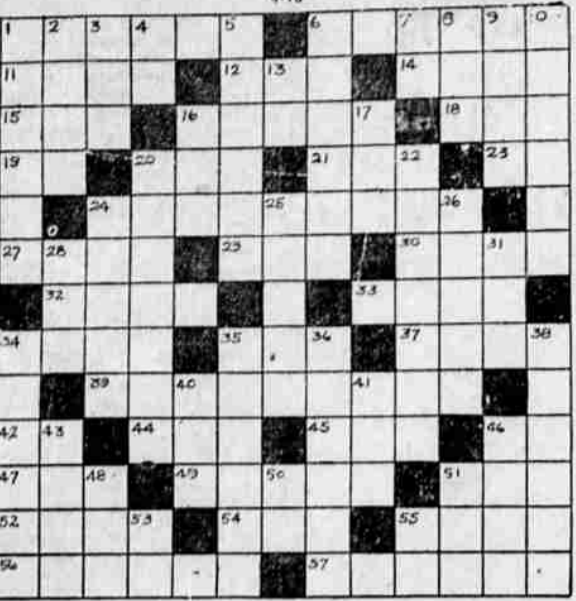

High water at several times has caused damage to the trestle work and extensive repairs were found necessary. It is expected that the work will be much more rapid from now on as plans are under way to push the project to completion.

TOBACCO TAX WILL BE IN EFFECT SOON

Eugene dealers who after May 25 will have to pay the special tax of 10 per cent on all cigarettes, tobacco and snuff under the new state law effective on that date will obtain the stamps to be attached to the packages through the county clerk's office, according to word received from the state treasurer.

It has been estimated that this tax would return to the state approximately \$1,000,000 during the remainder of the present biennium.

The law provides that its provisions shall be enforced by the state treasurer and that this official shall be the custodian of all funds realized under the act.

The state treasurer estimated that not less than 60,000,000 stamps of various denominations would be required to cover the retail sales of cigarettes, smoking tobacco and snuff during the remainder of this biennium. Under the law these stamps shall be provided by the state treasurer, who in turn will send them to the various county clerks of the state for distribution. Dealers will purchase these stamps from the county clerks.

All moneys received by the county clerks from the sale of these stamps shall be remitted to the state treasurer at the end of each month. This money will be turned into the general fund of the state and applied toward governmental expenses.

TRAP TEAM COMES FOR CONTEST HERE

To compete with a team selected from among the best shots of this district a squad of Benton county gunners will invade Eugene Sunday, April 20, for a match to be held at the traps at the local aviation field, according to announcement today of Walter McCornack, who is in charge of the arrangements for the event. The competing teams will be composed of 20 men each and the Eugene squad and captain will be selected some time during the coming week, is the announcement. In addition to the intercity match there will be a number of special events for individuals and smaller teams, according to present plans, which will provide plenty of action for spectators.

Four Enlist From Eugene in Service

Four men from Eugene have enlisted in the United States army here since April 1 and several other applications are pending, according to Lawrence Paige, in charge of recruiting work here. Eugene has enlisted in the infantry and will be assigned to the east coast, George W. Hatfield has enlisted in the air service and will go to the Philippines for training. Donald Hecker has entered the infantry and will be assigned to a post on the east coast as will John Sterling. The present month is expected to be the best in several years in number of enlistments, according to present indication, is the report.

Lodge Will Erect New Tennis Court

Members of Helmet lodge of the Knights of Pythias are to take advantage of the open ground south of their new home on Tenth avenue west at Olive street and plans are under way for the installation of a tennis court there, according to announcement today of officers of the lodge. A call for all tennis enthusiasts to turn out Monday evening to work on the court has been issued. This will depend on weather conditions is the added advice. Equipment for the court is available and it is hoped to have the ground ready for play in the near future.

Blanket of Snow Covers Klamath

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 18.—Klamath Falls this morning was covered with a two-inch fall of snow, and snow is still falling, accompanied by a brisk wind. A sudden drop of temperature during the night brought a return of chilling, wintry weather.

Public Learns of New Postal Rate

With the new postal rates in effect for four days now the public is becoming educated to the advanced tariff and there are fewer papers, packages and postcards mailed with insufficient postage, according to Darwin E. Yoran, postmaster. Although there are still quite a few cards and papers found in the drop boxes without the increased postage, Mr. Yoran said today. The supply of one-half cent stamps has been exhausted and the local office is waiting a new supply although there are plenty of the one and one-half cent stamps here, the postmaster states.

Lost Creek Route Will be Improved

Work on the grading and graveling of from one-half to three-quarters of a mile of the Lost creek road from the old Island mill will be under way as soon as weather permits, according to announcement today of P. M. Morse, county engineer. There will be about \$4200 available for this work as the special road tax voted in the Lost creek district will amount to about \$1200 and the county market road fund will provide about \$3000, the engineer said. The road was recently inspected by the county engineer and preliminary plans for the grading prepared.

Church Will Have Finance Campaign

Between 30 and 40 members of the Central Presbyterian church will take part in the annual financial campaign of the organization tomorrow afternoon according to announcement today of Rev. A. H. Saunders, pastor, who is in charge of the "Every Member" campaign. The campaign workers will meet at church for lunch following the forenoon services and then will start the canvass. The budget for the coming year will be raised during the annual campaign, it is announced.

'Crimson Eyebrows' Wins Favor of all Who Attend Affair

Picturesque and colorful settings of a palace garden in the flowery kingdom, a bit of modern wit and slang, and a suggestion of the imaginative and fanciful, one and together make "Crimson Eyebrows," the Chinese operetta of the University high school a most charming and artistic creation.

Nothing extravagantly elaborate is attempted in such an operetta and the simplicity attained is gratifying and appealing.

"Crimson Eyebrows" is the story of a Chinese emperor who seeks to banish the daughter of the former emperor. His idea is to have her marry "Neptune," king of the sea who is in reality a conspirator with the emperor. But Ting Ling, the princess, believing in the story of Neptune, meets Fanchong, leader of the "Crimson Eyebrows," and believes him to be Neptune for whom she is waiting. The emperor and Neptune are overpowered by Fanchong and things are restored to their right order.

Dean Scott makes an excellent impersonation, and has perhaps the stronger voice of the cast.

De Lillian Olson, as Ting Ling the princess, has a lovely voice for the part. Bradford Dutton as No Moo, a distant relative of the emperor, takes the comedy part well and keeps the audience chuckling. The chorus of thirty, who are ladies and nobles of the court, does excellently, and their fresh young voices are delightful to hear. Throughout the three acts of solo and chorus numbers there is some difficult and varied work done. The orchestra of twenty-one pieces is a talented group, and to them goes much credit for the success of the operetta.

The costumes can not go unmentioned. They are lovely, and though of the brightest hues, harmonize perfectly with the stage and its settings. Some of them are rare Chinese pieces, loaned especially for the operetta to give it the realistic atmosphere.

But "Crimson Eyebrows" is bound to be a success, for its director is no other than Anne Landshury Beck, whose work ever wins praise from Eugeneans.

The operetta will be given again tonight in the auditorium of the University school of music.
