Examiners Believe Livestock Rates Should be Altered

WASHINGTON, April 13--Rates on livestock moving to north Pacific points from Oregon and Idaho producing territory should be revised, the interstate commerce commission was told today by examiners who have completed an investigation. A distance scale of rates by which the cost of moving a carload of cattle 100 miles would be \$52 ranging up to a charge of \$156.50 for a carload moving a thousand miles, was recommended as a reasonable basis for new schedules. Double deck carloads of sheep, hogs or calves, should be charged at 125 per cent of the cattle rate, the recommendations said, and the rates to Seattle and Tacoma should be determined by adding to the Portland scale differentials which now exist. The examiners said the scale should be established tentatively and the parties to the proceedings be given the right to ask further adjustments in case the general investigation into the level of all freight rates should make a change advisable.

BULGARIANS ACT AGAINST BOMBERS

SOFIA, BULGARIA, April 13--(AP)--The Bulgarian government is taking extraordinary measures to prevent any further development of the terrorist campaign marked by the attempt against King Boris and the bombing of the Sveti Kral cathedral with a loss of 150 lives. Large number of communists and extremists have been arrested and it is reported that a number of communists were killed during the night. Having proclaimed martial law yesterday, the government now has ordered a house to house search. Street traffic is prohibited and patrols of soldiers and police pass incessantly. The city is in mourning and all the stores are closed. The possibility of an uprising is discounted but further outrages against persons and property are not unlikely and the authorities are taking all possible precautions. Two boxes of explosives and automatic pistols are reported to have been found at the Gostinets station, on the Paris-Constantinople railway route. It is believed they were to have been used in destroying a big bridge nearby.

NEW YORK, April 13--Charles H. Ebbets, president of the Brooklyn National league baseball club, died here at 6 o'clock this morning. He was 66 years old. Death came quietly. Farmers Union of Lane County Holds Meeting at Grove

COTTAGE GROVE, April 13--(Special)--Herbert Egbert of The Dalles, state president of the Farmers' union; Mrs. G. B. Jones of Monmouth, state secretary, and O. S. Fletcher of Eugene, Lane county agent, were among those present at a session of the Lane County Farmers' union here yesterday. Mr. Egbert urged a good attendance at the state convention of the union, to be held in Corvallis May 19-21. Mr. Egbert emphasized the benefit derived from national organization and co-operation and deplored the fact of the great distance between the producer and consumer and how great the cost of marketing the output has become. He mentioned the national convention which began in Kansas City on April 15. Mr. Fletcher gave a report of what is being done throughout the country to further the interests of agriculture. Farm crops was his subject. He said that at present there are 32 official test demonstrations of alfalfa this year, an established inspection of pure seed, nine demonstrations introducing copper carbonate as a wheat treatment against smut, a cow testing association, and the agricultural council, composed of a member from each farm unit in Lane county has been re-organized.
