REPORTS ON STATE LEGISLATION FROM FARMERS OFFERED

Summaries of the reports on the recent state legislation have been compiled by the joint legislative committee of the Lane county Farmers Union and the Pomona Grange. The committee in its report also submits a list of questions to the Lane county court and passes on the records of the Lane county delegation at the state legislative session.

The following is the report on the senators and representatives from Lane county.

"I heartily appreciate the work that Senator Fisk did in behalf of the agriculturist and feel that he has cooperated with the committee as far as possible.

"We also wish to give Representative Putter favorable mention for the stand he took on the Dennis bill, because we realize that the majority of his clients are not supporters of the income tax, and that he was not elected on an income tax platform.

"Senator Magliady and Representative Howard have not worked in accord with the policies recommended by this committee or in accord with the policies which have been advocated by our organizations for years past and we feel there is little in harmony between us from a legislative viewpoint.

"Representative Wheeler has for years been identified with organized agriculture but we feel that he will receive a considerable criticism for supporting the Mills bill, although he states he did so because of certain existing conditions and not because he favored the bill."

Car Theft Charge Made Against two

On a charge of the theft of the Ford coupe of R. C. Stacey of Cottage Grove two men were arrested at Roseburg last night on request of Deputy Sheriff Green Pitcher of Cottage Grove. The men gave the names of Felix Esposito and Angelo Messino to the authorities at Roseburg. Word received at the office of Sheriff Taylor of Lane from Douglas county is that the pair admitted being deserters from the United States army at Camp Lewis. The men probably will be returned here to answer the theft charge if they are not turned over to the army authorities for trial.

The Unitarians of the city will give a dinner at the Osburn hotel tomorrow evening at seven o'clock at which the guests of honor are to be the Rev. Lawrence Redfern of Liverpool, Eng., and Will L. Barnard of Boston. Mr. Redfern is one of the exchange speakers who comes to this country as an interpreter of Unitarianism at the time of the centenary celebration of the first hundred years of history on organized Unitarianism on both sides of the Atlantic. Mr. Barnard is executive secretary of the Unitarian Laymen's League with headquarters at Boston.

The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Brauneretter chapel, and interment will be in the Mulvey cemetery.
