Tonic For Golfers

As Prescribed by Wilfred Reid ONE of the big faults in iron club play is holding the club too loosely.

When a difficult approach shot must be made, tighten up your fingers in their grip on the club. That is where the control comes from.

It is not a bad practice to put the right hand over a little bit, which gives the fingers a better grip. As I have said, control is the big thing to be had in iron play, whether the shot is a long one or not.

Many amateurs have a weakness with the mashie and it has been my observation that a difference about taking a strange hold on the club is responsible for most of it.

A firm grip is necessary because the club may strike the ground hard enough to twist the club in the hands. And the feet may be a little farther apart than usual, the left foot some 15 inches in advance of the right.

The weight should be distributed evenly with perhaps slightly more on the right foot than on the left.
