NEW YORK, April 21.—Forty-eight men lost their lives today when the Japanese freighter Raifuku Maru sank off Nova Scotia, a wireless from the steamship Homeric informed White Star line officials this afternoon.

Reclamation Fund Increased \$186,440

WASHINGTON, April 21.—The reclamation fund was enriched by \$186,440 through fees and commissions from public land sales in the quarter ending March 31. In interior department figures made public today New Mexico led all states with receipts of \$30,208. California was second with \$29,211 and others included Wyoming \$24,608; Utah \$21,680; Montana \$19,227; Colorado \$18,522; Oregon \$8,218; Idaho \$7,949 and Washington \$7,310.
