

### THIRD FIRE BOND ELECTION CALLED BY CITY COUNCIL

A special city election will be called June 30 by the city of Eugene, to vote for the third time, if necessary, on the question of whether the city shall vote \$25,000 in bonds to pay for fire apparatus it is now using.

This resolution was passed by the city council last night, in anticipation of a possible unfavorable decision by the supreme court on the municipal auditorium bonds of \$500,000, with which the \$25,000 issue is tied up.

If the decision is favorable, the money will become available, it was stated. If not, the election is the only way out.

Many persons voting at the election last week misunderstood the measure, it is believed, voting against it because they felt it was for new apparatus, and not for equipment already bought, and which must be paid for.

Ordinances providing for a call for bids on \$100,000 of the bond issues passed last week were approved by the council. This includes the two paving intersection issues and the sewer issue.

The council favors the route of the Pacific highway through Eugene along Fairmount boulevard to Eighth avenue. It was decided, in reply to agitation for moving the route to Ninth avenue.

A public service commission hearing will be given at the request of the Southern Pacific on the closing of grade crossings at Columbia, Agate and Villard streets, it was announced.

Allocation of available money for street intersections will be made in order of date on which petitions were filed, the council voted.

Further protest of south Willamette residences on the type of pipe to be used for the sewer was indicated, when the council ordered Harry Devereaux, city engineer, to levy assessments for the project, in order to bring the impending action to a head.

A reading was given the ordinance providing for the city planning commission, and the document was held over until the next council meeting.

### LABOR SUPPLY IS NEARLY BALANCED

Demand and supply of labor in most industries of the west coast are now more nearly balanced than it has been since early last fall, it is indicated by reports from 41 employment service offices in various northwestern cities received at 41 headquarters in Eugene today. Few experienced laborers are out of work in any lumber district.

Extremely high water in some inland empire rivers has forced several sawmills to close temporarily. Woods work there is going ahead steadily, the reports show, and skilled woodmen are quite generally employed.

Condensed reports from the 41 offices follow:

Eugene: The two mills of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, Springfield and Wendling, both of which have recently been operating but four days per week, have returned to a five day cutting program. Farm labor in the Eugene district is well employed. Building and construction is at about normal for this time of year. There is plenty of help here to meet all current demands.

Portland: Logging along the Columbia river and adjacent districts is about 65 per cent of capacity. Labor turnover in the camps has increased. There are practically no experienced loggers out of work in this district. There has been a slight shifting of sawmill workers. The Pacific Spruce corporation's mill at Toledo has returned to a five-day week, following two weeks of four-day operation. There is still a large demand for farm workers. Calls for construction men are fewer but steady.

### Consolidation of Schools Favored

Preliminary plans for the proposed consolidated school district including eight districts in addition to the Junction City district are under way and a vote taken in Junction City favors the consolidation by a heavy majority. This is the first step in the proposed consolidation and now each district will petition and the matter will be taken up by the boundary board. If there is no remonstrance filed within the specified period of 20 days a day for voting will be set. A majority of the districts must vote in favor of the consolidation and a majority of the total vote cast is also necessary, according to E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools. It was first necessary for the city incorporated district to take a vote on the proposal. The other districts that will vote are Oak Grove, Laurel Home, Harpole, Meadowview, Riverside, Liberty, Lancaster and Harmony.

### Lane Route Plans Receive Approval

Approval of the state road engineers of the plans for the second section of the Crow-Vaughn and the Elk creek section of the Notli west road have been received at the office of P. M. Morse, county engineer. All market road estimates and plans are required to have the approval of the state department. Mr. Morse has also received word that the Virginia Bridge and Iron company of Los Angeles desires to get into touch with the local bidders on the new Hendricks bridge. The Lane engineer said that he does not believe that there will be any bids from this county at the highway commission meeting to be held Thursday and Friday at Portland.
