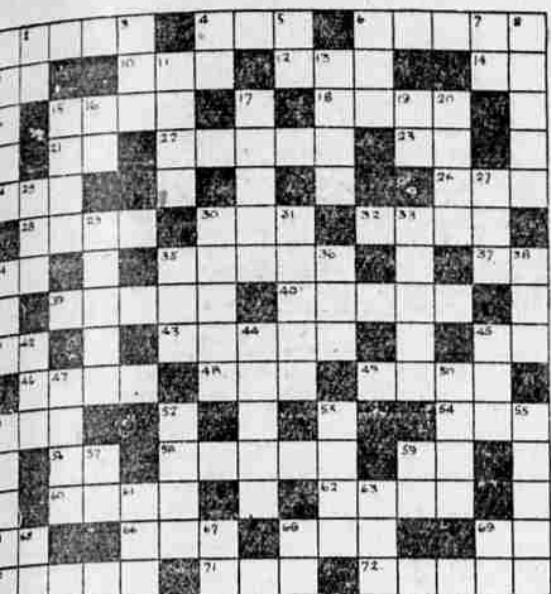


Today's Cross-Word Puzzle

Cynthia Grey Says:

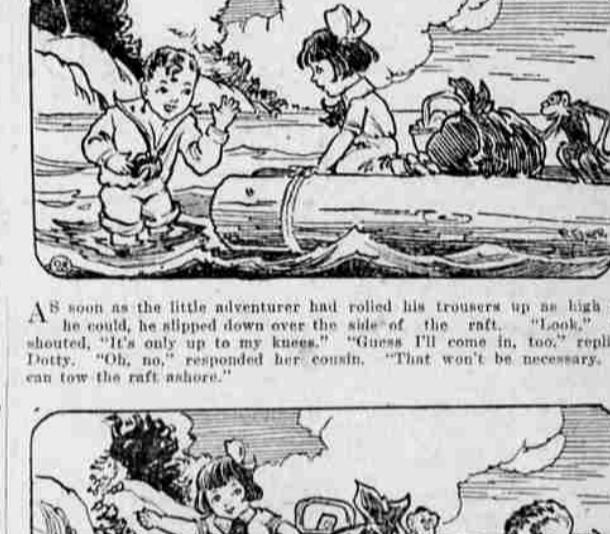
DEAR Miss Grey: How can I stop my fur choker from 'shedding'? Is it possible to clean furs satisfactorily in the home?—Martha S.

Farm Helps

VETCH as a cover crop and soil enricher for sweet corn increased the yield \$200 per acre, or about double it, according to reports from New Jersey growers. The experiment was conducted on a 90-acre farm. The county agent reported that part of one field where vetch had been plowed under produced twice as much sweet corn as a field where it had not been used. The difference between the yields where the vetch had been grown and plowed under and the field which had not been planted, in this cover crop was striking.
'Since sweet corn will make a gross return from \$200 to \$400 per acre,' says the county agent's report. 'It is conservative to say that by doubling their yield these growers increased their income by \$200 per acre.'

Home Hints

RUSTED screws are difficult to remove from wood, but if you apply a red hot iron to the head of the screw you can easily remove it with a common screw driver after it has become sufficiently heated.

Light by Day And Night

The window by day and the lamp at night makes this group at all times a center of light and comfort. At the same time it affords a pleasant view from the outside. In the case shown here, the small reading lamp on the table is enough to supply the light and decorative effect.

Drying Flannel

Do not put flannel garments close to a fire or register to dry. Let them dry slowly.

To Remove Iodine

Iodine may be removed from unstarched fabrics by soaking in cold water, or in white goods by being boiled in a starch solution. Sponging with alcohol is also effective.

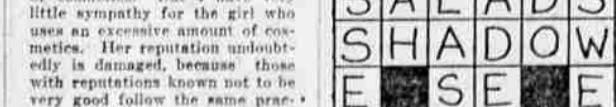

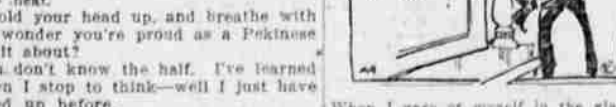
