Bids on Exchange Are up To 31-Cent Level; Other Grades Steady

PORTLAND, Apr. 22.—Fresh white eggs are firm and higher in the local market with bids on the exchange up a point to the 31c level. Demand for extras is brisk and daily arrivals are well absorbed. Other grades remain steady and unchanged.

A big upward trend in egg value here is anticipated by the local market as the season of heavy production at hand and heavy offerings cannot be absorbed for long. Storage facilities have already been liberal with most operators filled up to their cooler requirements.
