NORTH CAROLINA PUT ON BUSINESS BASIS FOR YEAR

RALEIGH, N. C., April 23.—(AP)—Every department and institution of North Carolina has been placed on a budget basis, as a result of legislation passed by the 1925 general assembly.

The governor, under the new law, becomes the real financial head of the state. He is vested with the power of drawing up, after consulting with the budget commission, the revenue and appropriation bills each two years, and he is charged with responsibility to see that appropriations are balanced by revenues.

Department heads are brought directly under the governor's control by the new law. He has been given the power to investigate the cost and methods of operation used by every department and institution, and may recommend to the legislature such changes as he feels are necessary to effect economies in government.

Heretofore numerous independent appropriation measures for individual institutions have been passed by each legislature. The result has been that the general appropriation bill seldom, if ever, carried amounts covering all state expenses. In addition a number of institutions, and practically every department, had the power to draw on the state treasury for funds and this resulted in large overdrafts of the general funds.

The new policy will become effective July 1, 1925. After that date all departments and institutions will have to keep expenditures within the definite amount fixed in the appropriation bill for their operations.

REFERENDUM IS TO BE INVOKED SOON

The tobacco tax and the Tithing bill were two of the revenue measures designed to rescue the state from a financial hole caused by a shortage of available funds for the present biennium amounting to about \$1,000,000.
