

SETTLERS ASK FOR DATA ABOUT STATE

Value of the co-operation of the various counties of the state in the land settlement program backed by the Portland chamber of commerce is stressed in the report for the past 10 months of that organization. Figures on the number of prospective settlers for Oregon gained during this period have been received by the Eugene chamber of commerce.

Incomplete reports from outside communities give a total of 657 families located in the state during the same period, with a capital investment of \$2,107,054.

Prospective settlers who have definitely stated their intention of coming to Oregon number 1677, of whom 740 returned signed questionnaires stating they were coming this year, bringing with them an aggregate capital investment of \$1,910,290.

38,596 Letters Sent Out.
A total of 38,596 letters were mailed out by the department, of which 24,715 were in answer to agricultural inquiries. More than 70,000 pieces of literature were forwarded to prospective settlers during the same period.

Evidence of the attitude of some of the leading communities toward the central organization is contained in letters on file at the land settlement department at Portland. C. D. Rorer, chairman of the Lane county land settlement committee and president of the Oregon State Bankers' association offered the following comment:

"Our outside communities feel that your department has been a most potent factor for a systematic and practical land settlement program for the state. We have reason to believe that many families have come to Lane county indirectly through your efforts and that many more will continue to come as a result of this timely work."

State Lodge Will Plan for Meeting

Lane county Odd Fellowship will send a large delegation to the seven-day grand lodge session to be held at Portland September 20 to 26, according to officers of the I. O. O. F. here. This will be one of the large national conventions held at Portland this year and the Oregon state Odd Fellows are making active preparations to greet the visiting delegates. Hotel accommodations are already being listed for the September convention, according to word received from the Portland committees in charge of the arrangements. A big delegation of Lane county Odd Fellows will attend the annual grand lodge sessions to be held at Ashland the latter part of May.

Car Owners Cited On Bond Law Case

Cited to appear in court for operating public service vehicles outside of the five-mile limit without obtaining the special public service bond, two car owners were fined \$10 each in justice court at Junction City yesterday. This bond is required of all public carriers that operate beyond five miles of where the cars are registered although so far there have been but few cases brought into court, according to Melvin Turnbull, county traffic officer, who cited the two drivers. A heavy penalty is attached to this provision of the state motor laws, a fine of \$1000 and one year in jail being provided. Oliver Ingram and Jesse Henderson were the car owners in court yesterday.

LUMBER BUSINESS ABOVE PRODUCTION

One hundred and twenty-one mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending April 18, manufactured 194,757,470 feet of lumber; sold 119,128,837 feet; and shipped 102,072,510 feet.

New business was 5 per cent above production. Shipments were 7 per cent below new business.

Thirty-seven per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 40,845,922 feet, of which 20,578,207 feet was for domestic cargo delivery; and 10,267,715 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 2,113 cars.

Thirty-eight per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 38,479,924 feet, of which 28,579,547 feet moved coastwise and intercoastwise; and 9,900,377 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 1,923 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 5,962,915 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 136,201,200 feet. Unfilled export orders 72,459,184 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 5,945 cars.

In the first sixteen weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 1,574,313,123 feet; new business 1,576,290,832 feet; and shipments 1,390,916,233 feet.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—The national woman suffrage association has formally ended its life of nearly 75 years devoted to the fight to obtain the vote for women. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president, presided at a meeting of its officers and other suffrage leaders called here yesterday for the formal dissolving of the organization through which Susan B. Anthony and other suffrage pioneers started before the Civil war, the movement which achieved its goal with the adoption of the nineteenth amendment five years ago.
