(Continued from page one) totaling \$225,478. Among the county awards was: Lane, \$29,979.24. Agreement Reached. Benton county succeeded in getting its long hoped for agreement with the state commission regarding the improvement of Corvallis-Newport highway from Corvallis to Wren station, some 8.3 miles. The commission agreed to do the grading and the county will surface the road. State Highway Engineer Roy Klein estimates the state's cost to be \$90,000, the county's \$90,000. The new line will eliminate two grade crossings and build an overhead at Wren station. The deal calls for the buying of right-of-way, grading, surf-

Many Eagles to Come to Eugene

Practically all of the 16 lodges of the Fraternal Order of Eagles in Oregon will send delegations here to attend the annual state meeting of the F. O. E. scheduled for June 15 and 16, according to an announcement today by O. E. Lee of this city, president of the state association. Plans are being made for competitive contests in degree work by the various lodges of which there will be several taking part, Mr. Lee said. The convention this year will be the largest ever held in Oregon in number of delegates, according to the state president.

Cascade Road Work Given Inspection

Nelson F. Macdoff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest, and F. H. Prudrage, in charge of road and trail work for the district, returned today from a trip up the McKenzie river to the snow line above Alder springs. They found fresh snow a mile below the spring, they report. The road is good most of the way, is the report brought back by the foresters. Between Nimitz and Blue river, a distance of 1.3 miles, most of the trip by auto—must be made in low gear. Men are at work on that section of road doing their best to get the right-of-way clearing brush clear-

ed up. They are also putting some gravel on parts of the new road where the ruts were very bad.

Mr. Brundage went to Cottage Grove this morning to make a trip up Row River with C. H. Neal, supervisor of the Unquapa national forest, to inspect some road work on Frank Brice creek. Mr. Macdoff and Mr. Brundage also took a trip up the South Fork, covering about 6 miles over the new road work done last year. They report two or three bad slides, and the road impassable by automobile, and in some places even by saddle horse.

China's Agreement Will Help French

PARIS, April 24.—Official circles declared that China's agreement to resume payment of the Boxer indemnity to France will greatly facilitate ratification by the French parliament of nine power treaties signed at the Washington conference. The agreement was signed a week ago yesterday. The other eight signatories ratified the nine power treaty.

119 GET JOBS IN U. S. OFFICE HERE

Bad weather conditions held employment down the last week to below the showing it would have been had clear weather prevailed. It is announced by Frank L. Armitage, superintendent of the United States employment office, who compiled his report for the week today.

A total of 119 persons obtained employment through the help of the office, it is shown by the report. Of this figure, 103 were men and 16 were women. Mill and logging camps demanded by far the largest number of workmen, 39 being sent to various mills or logging jobs over Lane county. The classification of men's positions is as follows: Men, 103: Farm hands, 12; casual workers, 24; common laborers, 13; kitchen hands, 3; cooks, 2; mill and logging camp hands, 39; machinist, 1; millwright, 2; chauffeurs, 2; teamster, 1; engineer, 1; fireman, 3; women, 16: House work, 7; waitresses, 1; kitchen workers, 2; stenographers, 2; cooks, 4.
