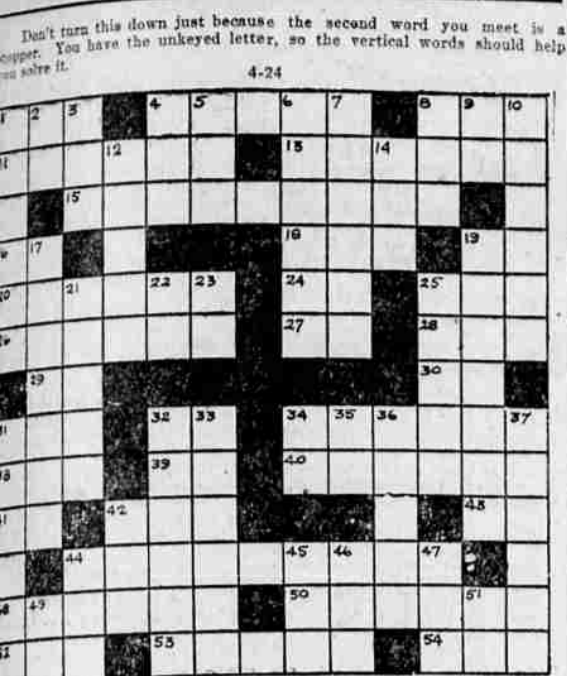


Today's Cross-Word Puzzle

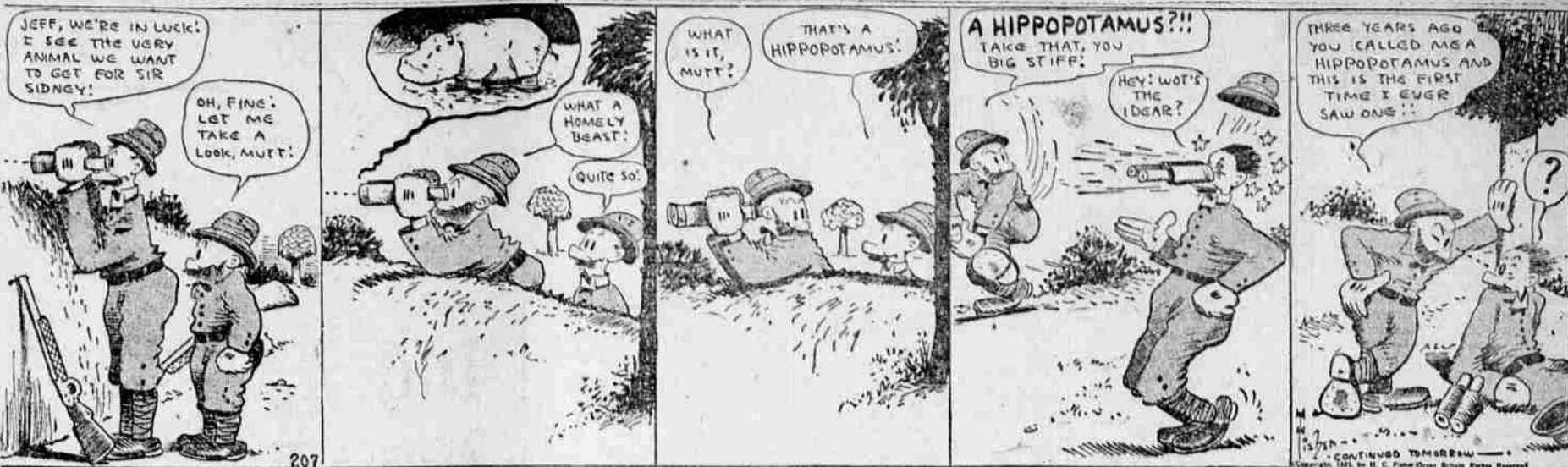

Farm Helps

THE Department of Agriculture estimates that more than 14,000,000,000 pounds of seed, exclusive of seed potatoes, seed sugar cane and other vegetative planting stocks are sown annually in the United States. Even a small improvement in the quality of seeds would result in larger crops with little or no additional expense and an enormous gain in the aggregate production or in an equal production on a smaller acreage. Improvements in his crops is well within the power of every farmer by means of buying better class seed from expert organizations which are constantly on the lookout for improved and higher yielding varieties, and by following the work of their local experiment stations which are constantly testing varieties with a view to determining their availability and value for the state which they represent.
