

EUGENEAN TO HEAD NEW LEGION BOARD

Robert A. Booth of Eugene, pioneer lumberman of Oregon and one of the best-known citizens of the state, has accepted the chairmanship of the state committee which is to have charge of the American Legion endowment fund campaign for Oregon and the drive for funds for the support of the Doernbecher hospital for crippled children. Announcement that Mr. Booth had accepted the chairmanship of the drive was made by George P. Griffith, department commander of the American Legion in Oregon.

With the selection of Mr. Booth as chairman, preliminary work for the campaign, which has for its object the raising of \$50,000 as the Oregon quota of the national endowment fund being raised by the legion and \$60,000 for the support of the Doernbecher hospital, will be started immediately. The legion is raising through out the nation a fund of \$5,000,000 the income from which will be used to carry on the organization's program of child welfare and disabled men's rehabilitation. Oregon's quota of this is \$50,000.

The selection of Mr. Booth to head the campaign is regarded by legion officials as admirable, as he has always been most active in public affairs in the state. He is a native of the state and was reared near Roseburg.

The selection of Mr. Booth was made by a committee composed of George P. Griffith, department commander of the legion Harold C. Jones, chairman of the child welfare committee, and Paul Davis, field secretary, representing the national headquarters of the legion. This committee was authorized to select the drive chairman and make arrangements for conducting the campaign.

ROTARY CLUB WILL OBSERVE BOY WEEK

National "Boys' week" of Rotary was opened last evening at a special service held at the Methodist church with a large number of members of the Eugene Rotary club present. Rev. J. Franklin Haas, pastor and Rotarian, talked on "The Possibilities of Youth" and short talks were also given by C. R. Clark, new director of Boy Scout work in Eugene, W. P. Walter, boys work secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and Charles A. Hardy, attorney, chairman of the boys work committee of the Rotary club. A roasting service of patriotic songs was held prior to the speaking program.

In his talk directed particularly to the large number of boys and young men present, Rev. Haas declared that the first 30 years constituted the foundation of manhood, the spring time of life, the time for plowing and sowing, the years in which to build for the future.

The first thirty, these are the critical years, now they pass there will be no harvest. And remember boys the sowing of "wild oats" should not be included in this program for there will be a harvest there also," was the advice given by the pastor.

In stressing the statement that hard work is necessary for success the speaker declared that genius was made up of arduous toil and that achievement and success depend on the amount of energy and force expended toward any definite end desired.

Decision is Made On Complications Of Soldiers' Bonus

Where a right to war risk compensation has already been established by dependent contract, and death compensation awarded, this award cannot be discontinued on account of bonus payments under the adjusted compensation act, it is announced by Miss Grace Norton, executive secretary of the Lane county chapter of the American Red Cross. A ruling on this point has been recently made by the Veterans' bureau, she says.

The adjusted compensation division also determines the question as to whether or not the payment is dependent on the date of death of the soldier, and if that condition existed, payment is made regardless of the fact that since that date such parent may have become wealthy.

The question as to whether the right to war risk compensation to parents is affected if applied for after adjusted compensation dependency payments have begun has been referred to the legal section of the bureau for decision.

The "National Disabled Soldiers' League," the organization that flooded Eugene mails recently with lead pencils and a plea for their purchase to aid wounded ex-service men, has been put out of business. This society, which was investigated by George E. Love, then commander of the local post of the American legion, was stopped by action of congress after its pencil-peddling activities were thoroughly probed.

Although the "league" advertised that its books were open to inspection no trace could be found of what became of its receipts for pencils. It was shown that "Commander" John T. Nolan was in the army for only a few weeks before the armistice. Kenneth Murphy, "adjutant," was proved never to have been in the army. Two men hired 50 men to attend an alleged convention, for \$3 a day each, and spent all the receipts for the pencils.
