

RAILROADS PLAN TO OPPOSE TAX LEVIED IN STATE

SALEM, Ore., April 27.—The law firm of Carey & Co., of Portland, representing the Oregon Electric Railroad company, the Spokane, Portland and Seattle, Oregon Trunk and other Hill lines, have written the public service commission denying the right of the commission to collect a gross earnings tax from those roads prior to expiration of 90 day period after the close of legislature, which would be May 28. The emergency clause on the gross earnings act and the attempt of the commission to collect the tax at the time the companies file their annual statements on or before May 1, the Portland attorneys hold, is contrary to the Oregon constitution.

Saturday the commission received a letter from the general attorney of the Western Union Telegraph company in New York, indicating that the Western Union will resist payment of the tax measure to carry the emergency clause.

THOMPSON CREEK ROAD APPROVED

The proposed Thompson creek road of two miles, which will be in the form of an extension to the proposed Eugene-Florence road, has definitely been approved by the district forest office, it is stated by R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the Siuslaw forest, who returned today from a trip to Portland, Salem and Hebo.

At Portland Mr. Shelley conferred with forest officials on proposed road and trail work inside his forest this season, and at Salem he attended the meeting of the state board of forestry, at which policies for the year and the new state laws with reference to fire prevention were discussed.

The Thompson creek road will extend from the terminus of the Eugene-Florence road, which now extends as far as Raincroft, he states. At Hebo, Mr. Shelley conferred with L. E. Garwood, ranger, with regard to the forest work program.

Mr. Shelley expects to go to Toledo the latter part of this week to attend the annual meeting of the Lincoln County Fire Protective association, with which the forest co-operates each year in fire prevention work. A member of the Siuslaw staff is also scheduled to give an address at the University of Oregon student meeting Friday, it is announced.

Tillamook Slayer Will be Taken to Jail in Portland

TILLAMOOK, Ore., April 27.—Mrs. M. C. Paton, indicted last Saturday on a charge of second degree murder in connection with the death of her grandchild, Sylvia Louis Dreamp, following a hearing, will be taken to Portland today and placed in the county jail there until May 4, the date set by Judge Bagley for her to plead. The removal to Portland was due to lack of proper facilities here for women prisoners.

Drilling for oil To be Continued

Preparations for the resumption of drilling at the well of the Guaranty Oil company have been completed and work will be under way at once, according to announcement late this afternoon by Dr. David Eugene Olson. The gas flow which broke out at the well about a week ago is now controlled and everything is set for the continuation of the interrupted operations, it is announced. Dr. Olson states that his early statement that the oil strata in Lane lies under that of the oil strata in Clatsop and that the oil will undoubtedly be struck when some additional drilling is completed. Dr. Olson reports that the drill at the Cottage Grove well of the Guaranty company is now down about 2000 feet.

70 Miles of Phone Line to be Built

Seventy miles of telephone building in this season's construction program for the Siuslaw national forest, reports H. H. Long, chief clerk of the forest, today. This work will be spread over various sections of the forest, he says, with a large share in the vicinity of Mapleton.

New trail totaling more than 14 miles in length will be built in the vicinity of Scottsburg. It is announced. This is known as the Scottsburg, Smith River trail, and shipping of materials is already under way in advance of the work. A telephone line will also be built along the route of the trail, according to Mr. Long.

A lookout house is also being erected this year on Cummings Peak, and the employees stationed at that point will not be required to camp out all summer, as was necessary last year.

Mr. Long has been invited by members of the College Crest community club to deliver an address on American Forestry week at the meeting Thursday night.
