

SUPPORT FOR FUND FOR CHARITY WORK IN LANE REQUESTED

Commending the work of the Salvation Army in Lane county and urging support of the financial campaign now under way by the local corps, George H. McMorran, past exalted ruler of the Eugene lodge of Elks, issued a statement today.

The following is the statement of Mr. McMorran: "For a great many years I have been directly or indirectly connected with the charitable work of the Salvation Army, and in my opinion no organization gets greater results from the amounts spent than does the Salvation Army. They do a kind of work and reach a class of people which no other religious organization seems to reach. Their charity extends into a field which reaches those who are worthy, but who generally do not ask for assistance when in need because of the seeming embarrassment and humiliation entailed. The Salvation Army gives this assistance without advertising or advising the public who is receiving the benefits.

"The Elks lodge, of which I have had intimate knowledge for many years, is continually doing charity work, and this work is done entirely through the Salvation Army. When in doubt as to the worthiness of a case in question the Salvation Army is asked to investigate, and in each case so far as I know, the reports received have been just and fair to the person or families investigated.

retired field marshal general and entitled to wear a military etiquette under which the president-elect grew up, it is regarded as an insult if a military man visits the troops in civilian dress. On the other hand, if he appears in uniform before the Reichstag it is considered certain he will give offense to that body. The president-elect thus seems to be facing a real dilemma.

AUSTRIA DISPLEASED

VIENNA, April 22.—(AP)—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's election to the German presidency is regarded here as a serious blow to the idea of an Austrian union with Germany and is deplored by the newspapers of all parties.

The Neue Freie Presse while hoping for the best, characterizes it as a misfortune for the German people, while the Abend says: "Von Hindenburg is a victory of European discord over the Dawes plan and the London agreements."

STRIKE SUGGESTED

BERLIN, April 22.—(AP)—The communist organ Rote Fahne (Red Flag) today published an open letter to the trade union and socialist executive urging a 24-hour strike on the day Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's entry into Berlin, to assume the presidency to which he was elected Sunday.

SOVIETS ASTONISHED

MOSCOW, April 22.—News of the election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg as president of Germany, was received with astonishment in Soviet Russia, where people had been led to believe that the aged military leader had little chance of success. His triumph is especially unwelcome to the Russian communists, who know his vowed hostility to Bolshevism.

Some Soviet leaders believe that after a few months in office Von Hindenburg may attempt to have the former crown prince appointed regent with the ultimate object of completely restoring the German crown.

COUNCIL UNCERTAIN

PARIS, April 22.—(AP)—The allied council of ambassadors at its meeting tomorrow will, it is understood, give Marshal Poincaré's report on Germany's violation of the Versailles treaty a quick scrutiny and will then await further study of the situation by the chancellors of the various interested powers before taking action. This policy, it was said, in official circles this morning, will be pursued by the allies' desire above all, to avoid anything that might provoke further reaction in Germany such as was manifested in the election of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg to the presidency.

Negotiations concerning the German security pact offer will be conducted on the same policy of avoiding anything that could be used as fuel for the reactionary campaign in Germany. Foreign Minister Briand will soon reply to the offer of Dr. Stresemann, the German foreign minister in such a way as to encourage possible continuation of the efforts toward an agreement, it was indicated, but without giving the hope that France will abandon her allies, Poland and Czechoslovakia, with their vital interest in the question of Germany's eastern border which that nation desires to reopen eventually.

CONCERTS RESUMED

BERLIN, April 22.—The victory of the nationalists in the presidential election has been closely followed by the resumption of the band concerts in the public squares, customary in the days of the monarchy and which consisted chiefly of the rendition of patriotic airs.

At the Wittenberg Platz yesterday afternoon, the band played the "Army March Number 9," the "Kaiser Waltz" by Strauss, the "Friedrich Rex," march, the "Black, White and Red," imperial flag song and "Deutschland Uber Alles."

Installation of Rev. E. L. Winterberger as pastor of the Fairmount Presbyterian church will be held Wednesday evening, April 23, starting at 7:30 o'clock. Heads of the Presbyterian church in this district will take part in the installation ceremony.

Rev. A. H. Saunders, pastor Central Presbyterian church; Rev. Bruce J. Giffin, university pastor, and Rev. Theo. Large, Presbyterian Sunday school missionary will take part in the services. The public are welcomed. The people of Fairmount should show their appreciation of this progressive step by being present and welcoming Mr. and Mrs. Winterberger as workers in the community, in the request of the church officials.

"It should be a matter of much interest to the people of the Fairmount Presbyterian church has decided to call a permanent pastor. While the church has served a large need and maintained an excellent Sunday school for many years, it has not heretofore felt strong enough to install a pastor. With the rapidly increasing population and the splendid support now being given, the congregation decided to take this forward step," it is announced.

"Mr. Winterberger is a preacher of acknowledged ability. His sermons are scholarly and philosophic but full of devotion and faith in Christ and the bible. There is a decided evangelistic appeal in most of his sermons.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Winterberger are tireless and enthusiastic workers and possessed of kindly sympathetic and devoted Christian characters. Their influence will be decidedly felt in the community."
