

### MANY ESSAYS ARE SENT TO COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT

Many history essays are being received at the office of E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools, by pupils in various districts of the county who are to compete for the series of prizes offered as a feature of the school children's pageant to be held here Saturday, May 9, according to announcement today. All essays must be in at the superintendent's office by tomorrow night as that is the time limit set.

The prizes will be awarded at the annual meeting to be held May 9 and the winning essays will be read to the audience, according to the program.

Mr. Moore states that the children have displayed a remarkable interest in the essay writing and that many very fine essays have been turned in. Interesting details of the life and events of the Lane county community, many of which have been overlooked by the historians, are told in the essays by children who have spent considerable time talking with the pioneers in their neighborhood.

"Little human interest stories that may not exactly be classed as of historical importance but nevertheless, giving a vivid picture of life in the pioneer days have been compiled by the children," the superintendent states.

### Radio Programs to End Friday, May 22

Eugene speakers, musicians and other entertainers, who have appeared on the radio program of KGW in Portland, under direction of the university's extension service, will be heard no more after Friday, May 22, it is announced from the university. Members of the summer session school faculty will give some lectures during July, but the regular weekly lectures will not be resumed until the opening of school next fall.

The extension division has planned a series of four lectures to be given during May from KGW, Portland. Professor Hugh E. Rossen, debate coach for Oregon, will lecture Friday, May 1, on "The Speaker's Side of the Microphone." Benoit McCroskey, winner of the Oregon State Contest of the Intercollegiate Peace association, will deliver his oration, "The Last Milestone," on May 8. Dr. Edwin T. Hodge, of the geology department, will speak on May 15, on the McKenzie river country. Miss Moselle Hall, of the extension division, will give the last lecture on May 22, discussing the study of local history in the various school districts of Oregon.

### Strip of Roadway Is to be Oiled

Plans for oiling the strip of county road, between 400 and 500 feet, between the Pacific highway and the Springfield bridge are being made and it is probable that this means will be used to lay the dust on this stretch of road, according to O. E. Crowe, county commissioner. "We will try the crude oil method on this road and it is expected that it will not be necessary to make more than two applications during the summer in order to keep the dust down," the commissioner said today. Arrangements will probably be made with an oil company to have a tank truck spread the oil, Mr. Crowe said.

### Recruits for Navy Services are Asked

Recruiting for the United States naval service has been resumed and two recruiting officers, J. N. Cochran, chief water tender, and L. R. Swails, chief boatswain mate, will be here Wednesday and Thursday, April 29 and 30 at the Hoffman hotel to receive applications in this district. The naval recruiting officers are now at Salem receiving recruits in that district. Boys enlisting in the naval service now have a very good chance of joining the fleet at Honolulu and making the cruise to Australia. The fleet leaves Honolulu about July 15 to be absent about two months, according to word received from the naval service recruiting service at Port land.

### Bus Referendum To be Opposed

That all commercial organizations of the state should pass resolutions opposing the referendum involved against the motor bus bill passed at the last legislative session is the suggestion received at the Eugene chamber of commerce from The Dalles Wasco county chamber of commerce. The Wasco organization recently passed a resolution opposing the referendum on the ground that the bill will protect and preserve the state highway investment from loss due to increasing commercial truck travel. The Eugene chamber has taken no action as yet but the matter may be taken up for discussion, according to chamber officials.

Mrs. Acheson was born near Drunquin, in Ireland, and with her family emigrated to Oregon in 1890, and settled in the western part of Lane, enduring many of the hardships of those days.

She had been in failing health for the past year.

Besides her husband, Charles Acheson, she is survived by the following children: Mrs. F. W. Taylor, Joseph, Andrew J., and George E. Acheson, all of Swiss home; Mrs. B. J. Downing of Blachly, who were at her bedside during the end came, and Mrs. Fred J. Wells of Kerry. She is also survived by a brother, David Hunter, of Swiss home.

Interment was made in the Deadwood cemetery.

### Bonus Duplicates Not Being Issued

The United States government is not at present issuing any duplicates of lost federal bonus insurance certificates, announces Lawrence Paige, recruiting officer for the army, who is aiding veterans in applying for the bonus at his office in the basement of the court house.

A question has been raised, says Mr. Paige, as to whether the present law authorizes issuance of such duplicates, and an attempt is being made to secure an amendment during the coming session of congress covering this point.

The insurance is not jeopardized by the loss of the policy, although the government advises that it would be a protection for the loser to notify the adjusted compensation division of the veterans' bureau at once of any such loss, it is stated.
