

YOUNG MATRON MAKES ESCAPE

HOOD RIVER, Ore., April 29.—Highways in this vicinity are being watched for an automobile in which Mrs. Helen Blair, young bond matron, escaped from an auto in which she was being taken to Salem, where she was to serve a sentence in the state industrial school for girls.

The escape occurred here yesterday when the auto in which Mrs. Blair was traveling in custody of District Attorney Moore, of Bend, and Mrs. Ethel V. Johnson, an officer of the women's protective bureau, stopped at a filling station.

The woman boarded a car which drove off at a rapid rate of speed which soon put it out of sight. The car bore a California license, A-95-766. It was last heard of traveling at a high speed on the west side orchard road.

District Attorney Moore said he believed the car was driven by a former Klamath Falls policeman named Jones.

Mrs. Blair was sentenced to the state school following conviction of possessing intoxicating liquor.

\$38,000 in School Warrants is Paid

School warrants paid by the Eugene school district during the last two weeks have totaled more than \$38,000, it was announced today by O. H. Jones, clerk of the school board.

The money for payment of these outstanding warrants became available from tax collections, according to Mr. Jones.

Each warrant bears interest at 6 per cent, which is figured in the school office. Eugene banks have carried a large share of the warrants, but many are turned in from other sources.

Virtually all teaching appointments in local schools for next year have been made, it is announced. Teachers numbering 109 appeared on the last payroll, and it is expected the schools will require 115 or 120 on the staff next year.

This is the first time this year that the two teams have met, and much interest has been aroused. FATHER BEATEN; KNICKERS CAUSE

Winsome Miss Ordered to Ride Bicycle; Knickers Provided Ease. But Natives Didn't Like It, and Flogged Her Parent

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 29.—Appearance of a girl wearing knickers and riding a bicycle is not considered appropriate for women in the little town of Cedar Grove.

So when Miss Jewel Barker, 15, appeared in mannish garb with her wheel, Puritanical neighbors immediately objected.

Which led to a flogging that is unequalled even in Puritanical days. The innocent victim of a mob's fury was the girl's father, John Barker, 53 years old.

Advised to Ride.
Miss Barker, frail and unhealthily, was advised by her doctor to try riding a bicycle. So she purchased a wheel and a pair of white knickers, and started exercising each day on the town and country roads.

The neighbors looked on with astonishment. At first it was deep curiosity, then resentment. The father should permit his daughter to appear on highways and streets "dressed up like a man."

The men folk of the village were more concerned than the women. Mysterious warnings were received by the father.

"Keep that girl out of that rig," was one message, scrawled in a male hand.

The parent tried to explain that the family physician had advised bicycling as the exercise the girl needed. And that to be comfortable on the daily rides knickers were necessary.

Father Beaten
One night, after repeated warnings had been sent to Barker, he was lured to a lonely spot in the country and given a severe beating.

He was warned that he would be flogged again if his daughter appeared any more in the knickers and further threatened with death if he disclosed the affair.

Recently the father became ill and it was with difficulty he was able to provide the necessities for his family. This came to the attention of well-to-do workers, who thus by chance discovered the affair.

Two Hundred Boys Ousted From School

GLADSTONE, Mich., April 29.—Two hundred boys students of Gladstone high school—all but on boy of the four upper classes—were expelled today for coming to school minus neckties and with their collars unbuttoned.

The boys informed the teachers they would obey the dress regulation only when the girl students were compelled to stop wearing their stockings rolled.

APARTMENT HOUSE IS SWEEPED BY FIRE

men who occupied the 49 apartments fled to the street in what attire they were able to don.

The flames broke out shortly after three a. m., and raged for more than an hour before firemen were able to enter the building and search for the bodies which were found huddled in the rooms. The bodies of Miss Shore and Miss Frazier were found in their rooms where they apparently had been trapped. The body of Mr. Lawr also was discovered in his room.

Mr. Lawr managed to make her escape from the building, but not before she had sustained burns, which attending physicians feared might prove fatal. Mr. Lawr was blind and apparently had been unable to find his way from the burning building.

Sullivan Leaps
Sullivan died as the result of injuries sustained when he leaped from the fourth floor of the building and missed a net which firemen had spread to save him after he had been trapped with no chance of escape.

The fire started in the basement from the furnace or a defective flue, said Fire Marshal Grenfell after an investigation. The flames swept up the stairway, carried by a draft from a skylight.

Credit for saving many lives was given Captain C. O. Haines and members of engine company No. 3, who were first to reach the fire. The occupants of the building were crowded at the windows screaming for help when the firemen arrived, and first efforts with ladders and life nets were devoted to rescue.

The death of Sullivan was declared by firemen due to the fact that he jumped before the life net was fully spread. Owing to smoke and trees near the building the firemen did not see him jump until too late to catch him in the net.

Mr. Chamberlain Has More Guards

LONDON, April 29.—(AP)—Additional guards have been assigned to protect Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain, presumably in connection with the discovery of a plot against his life.

The news of additional police protection for the British foreign secretary came from official quarters, but there was much reticence about discussing the nature of the supposed plot. It was intimated that some of the details were discovered outside of London.

FOREST LECTURER SPEAKS IN EUGENE

An illustrated address by Albert Weisendanger, lecturer for the United States forestry office on forest protection and fire prevention, was given this morning at Eugene high school at 8:30 o'clock. The gymnasium was darkened, and Mr. Weisendanger showed by the slides the correct way to leave camp fire to prevent their spreading to trees.

The lecture was preceded by a demonstration by the camp cookery club of the proper methods of building and extinguishing camp fires. Mr. Weisendanger also entertained the students with harmonica selections, which drew loud applause. He demonstrated what could be packed in a kit in a very small space by unpacking his own kit for the audience.

The speaker stressed the value of young people attending to the putting out of campfires when in camp with their parents or other adults, who were usually very busy doing other work.

The same lecture was given by Mr. Weisendanger at the University high school at 11 o'clock p. m., the Frances Willard junior high school at 1:45 o'clock this

afternoon and at the Geary school at 2:45 o'clock. Tomorrow morning he will speak before the high school, junior high school and sixth grade students of Springfield tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.
