

### LIGHTING LAW IS SUBJECT OF TALK TO LOCAL DRIVERS

The new Oregon automobile lighting law effective May 28 is the same law that has been adopted in 22 other states, and is approved by the United States department of commerce, Frank A. Pim of the secretary of state's office, told motorists, police officers, auto dealers and mechanics last night in a talk at the armory. Kenneth Bloom, assistant traffic chief, also spoke.

Mr. Pim spoke on the purpose of the service stations for adjustment of headlights. All headlight stations, he said, will be under supervision of the department of state, and will be inspected at frequent intervals by the officers of the traffic division. Secretary of State Keizer, with his usual thoroughness has worked out the details of the law, which completely protects the motorist as well as the headlight adjuster and insures correct adjustments at reasonable prices.

"Motorists must remember that upon them is the liability for wrongly adjusted headlights," said Mr. Pim, "and that even though they have had them adjusted recently, that they must observe occasionally whether the beams are in correct focus, which can be readily done by placing a line on the garage wall or door, the same height as the center of the headlights from the floor, observing whether or not the main intensities are below that line as required.

"It will be illegal for a person to have a spotlight or foglight on the right-hand side of the car. These lights should be placed on the left-hand side, not less than eight inches to the left of the axis of the vehicle, and are to be so attached that they cannot be moved without the use of tools. The beam must be directed across to the right-hand side, striking the roadway to the right of the center and not to exceed 75 feet ahead. The beam of the spotlight must be so adjusted that when shining upon a screen 25 feet distant from the vehicle, it will be no larger than 40 inches in diameter.

"This law becomes operative after May 28, and after September 1 it shall be unlawful for anyone to sell or offer for sale any new car of motor vehicle not equipped with devices specified by the secretary of state, and motorists have until that time to make the adjustments required by law. Motorists will not be required to dim their headlights when traveling upon the highways during dry weather, but owing to the conditions of reflection that are evident upon the surface of the highway when it is wet, it was deemed advisable to require the dimming of headlights on wet pavement and in passing an approaching car."

### SPECIAL HANDLING OF MAIL EFFECTED

The "special handling" service for parcel post under the new postal law which went into effect April 15, offers a better and speedier service for this class of mail, which postal users may or may not purchase at their own option, according to Darwin E. Moran, postmaster.

"Special handling," in this law, means, practically speaking, that such parcel post is to be handled, not as parcel post is customarily handled, but as first-class mail is handled. So far as the nature of the mail permits the "special handling" stamp makes parcel post first-class mail.

In particular advantage applies mainly to the handling en route on railroads and other transportation facilities between the post office of dispatch and the post office of destination. It must be carefully distinguished from the "special delivery" service, where the chief advantage applies after the arrival of mail at the post office of its destination.

"Special handling" of parcel post means speeding up the service en route on the trains, etc., while "special delivery" means speeding up the service after its arrival. It requires both services and both stamps to obtain the best and speediest mail service possible. Neither does any part of the work of the other.

As first-class mail is not specially delivered unless it bears a special delivery stamp, so, therefore, "special handling" parcel post will not be specially delivered after its arrival unless it, too, bears the special delivery stamp.

A "special handling" stamp for parcel post costs 25 cents, while a special delivery stamp for parcel post up to and including 2 pounds costs 10 cents, up to and including 10 pounds costs 15 cents, and thence up to the limit of weight of parcel post 20 cents. Add the special handling (25 cents) to the special delivery (10 cents, 15 cents, or 20 cents) and one has the very best service possible for any article of parcel post. This is in addition to the regular postage as provided in the new law.

### LUMBER BUSINESS REPORTED ACTIVE

One hundred and twenty-two mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending April 25, manufactured 106,379,042 feet of lumber; sold 119,915,587 feet; and shipped 118,417,947 feet.

New business was 13 per cent above production. Shipments were 1 per cent below new business.

Fifty per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 59,460,240 feet, of which 45,125,976 feet was for domestic cargo delivery; and 14,334,264 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 1,835 cars.

Forty-five per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 52,891,700 feet, of which 40,115,329 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal; and 12,776,371 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 2,004 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 5,465,347 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 156,465,908 feet. Unfilled export orders 83,532,945 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 5,823 cars.

In the first seventeen weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 1,478,092,165 feet; new business 1,636,296,426 feet; and shipments 1,714,433,280 feet.
