### FOREST FIRES ARE HELD GREAT WASTE

Destruction of several thousand acres of Lane county forest land by fire last year meant the destruction of hundreds of thousands of dollars in potential revenue to the county, according to Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest.

"A great number of people in Eugene and Lane county are supported by industries dependent on forest materials," says Mr. Macduff. A goal authority calculates that one-tenth of the American people are dependent upon the forests. According to the National Lumber Manufacturers' association 1,100,000 persons are directly employed in the industries that produce and remanufacture forest material.

"Regular cropping of the 470,000,000 acres of forest land now remaining will always maintain 12,000,000 people. If the forests are to be virtually abandoned when the standing timber crop is removed a great disruption of economic relations will follow. Moreover, America will needlessly be deprived of one of its greatest sources of natural wealth. The forests have contributed immensely to the piling up of our huge national wealth. Moreover, like agriculture, but unlike mining, the forests are not inherently exhaustible. Forests may be grown forever on the same land without exhausting it.

There is a fierce competition among the nations for control of raw material. The United States may, if it will, always own and control a sufficient supply of forest products. The first steps involve a national forest policy, protection against forest fires, equitable taxation of forest land, and wise extension of publicly owned forests."

### Work on new Plant To Start at Once

SPRINGFIELD, April 30.—(Special)—Work on the building of the new Carbonsium Wood-Preserving plant will probably begin next week, according to Charles G. Wilson, general manager. The company purchased 14 acres of land just off Fifth and M street some time ago, and the Southern Pacific has been at work constructing a 700-foot spur which

comes off the Southern Pacific line near the old Fisser-Boutin mill. Until the new plant can be built business will be conducted as usual at the old plant a quarter of a mile away from the new site, on property leased from the Weinhardt estate. Mr. Wilson said that the plant would be added to its activities in the industry warrants. The company has just been awarded a contract by the Southern Pacific company to furnish 2000 treated poles, and one from an eastern concern for 2000.

### FIVE VACANCIES WILL BE FILLED BY MR. COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Acceptance by the president of the resignation of Solicitor General Beck, expected to take effect at an early date, adds another prospective vacancy to four others already existing in important offices which are receiving the president's attention. In addition the executive also will be called upon soon to consider some reappointments in the administration.

Acceptance of Mr. Beck's resignation, definite and formal announcement of which is expected in the near future, had been delayed by the president since it was submitted at the beginning of the new administration in March in order to give him opportunity to decide on a successor. Mr. Beck is planning a trip to Europe in May.

The other important vacancies now existing and to which appointments are expected shortly are: on the tariff commission and in the office of assistant secretary of state, assistant secretary of labor. A long standing vacancy exists also on the international joint commission.

Among the several terms of office soon to expire is that of R. E. Haney of the shipping board. He is a democratic member from Oregon and has been recommended for reappointment by Senator McNary, republican, of that state.
