The traditions committee, the university students council last night opened to smoking all sidewalks parallel to public streets running adjacent to or through the university campus. All sidewalks, therefore, on Eleventh, Kincaid, Thirteenth and University streets are open to smoking. The strip of parking on the north side of Thirteenth street from Kincaid to University was also opened to smoking. The motion which takes effect immediately, does not allow any privileged districts. It is understood, however, that smoking is permitted in

Friendly hall and in the men's room of the Woman's building.

Convention To Be Held—The mathematics department of the university is preparing to send out personal invitations to all members of the western section of the National Mathematics society, to attend the convention of this branch of the society to be held in Eugene June 17. This is the first time that the society has ever met in the Northwest, and the university should be proud of the honor of being the first northwestern university to be host, declared Professor E. E. DeCou of the mathematics department.

Elections Are Next—With the student union drive past, campus interest is now centering on nominations for student body officers. The nomination of candidates will be made at assembly on May 7. The elections will take place on Wednesday, May 13. Candidates not nominated at the assembly may get their names on the ballot if a petition signed by 50 students is filed with the student body secretary not later than two days following regular nomination.

Ballet Features Prom—A miniature ballet, depicting the spirit of the times characteristic of the period upon which the decorations are based, will be the feature for the university's Junior Prom in the gymnasium, May 23. Delbert Faust, local ballet instructor, will arrange and instruct the dancers who will take part in the feature. Edna Dipple will act as assistant to Mr. Faust in the instruction of the dancers, who will be campus talent.

Officers Elected—Officers were elected by the Eugene H-Y club at its annual meeting last night at the Y. M. C. A. Gerald Towne was chosen president; Delmar Newnam, vice-president; Delbert Addison, secretary; Glenn Bessonoff, treasurer; and A. E. Brigham, business adviser. Two new members, Donald Sheybe and Clifford Horner, were admitted. Installation will be May 6 at the "Y."

Carpenter Work Resumed—A crew of union carpenters in Portland were to start work today on the Taylor apartment house at Thirteenth and Willamette, from which the workmen walked out Monday morning over a \$1 a day wage increase dispute. They asked a minimum scale of \$7 a day. The Portland carpenters are going to work under an \$8 scale, it is announced by Zanello brothers contractors.

Undergoes Operation—Dorothy Winters of the Eugene Book store underwent a minor operation yesterday.

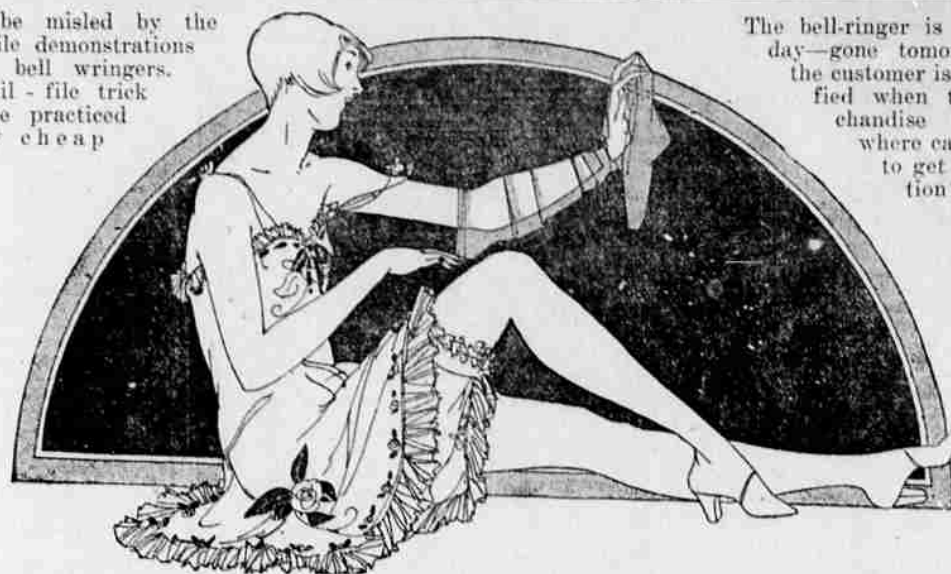

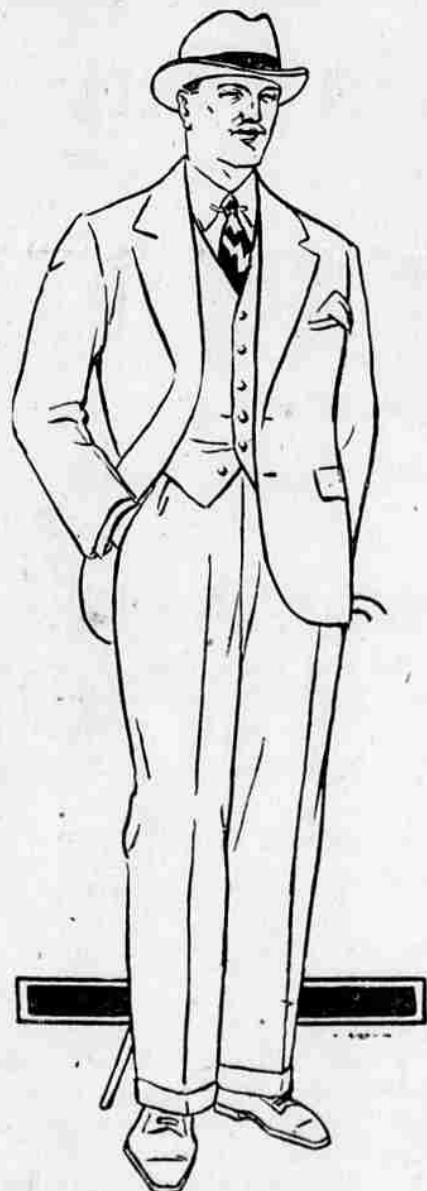
How to Launder Silk Hose to Best Advantage

The chief enemies of silk hose are dirt and perspiration. There is acid in perspiration which attacks the silk if allowed to remain. Silk hose should be washed every night immediately after wearing. Into soft lukewarm water dissolve a tablespoon of lux. See that soap is well dissolved. Never use laundry soap or washing powders. Wash stockings by raising and lowering them in water. Never rub silk hose. In rinsing the stockings a teaspoon of vinegar added to a bowl of water will help restore the lustre of silk. Never use hot water or an iron. Hot water will injure the color no matter how fast the dye. Squeeze water out gently and allow stockings to dry. Never send silk stockings to a laundry.

Proof of Soldier's Death is Important

If a dependent of an ex-service man has reason to believe that the veteran is dead, although there is no positive proof of the fact, such dependent should file an application for adjusted compensation in order to protect her rights and to have the application on file before the expiration date, announces Miss Grace Norton, secretary of the local Red Cross chapter.

"A statement should be made on the application indicating why it is thought the veteran is dead," says Miss Norton. "If this can be substantiated by affidavits from disinterested individuals these should be attached. If the evidence is strong enough to be conclusive the war department may certify the claim for payment. If not, the application will be placed on file and the dependent later may submit any evidence of death, thus reopening the claim."
