No new punches have been introduced in boxing since Jim Corbett's heyday.

Unless you wish to call Kid McCoy's corker's punch a new one. And Joe Choynski claims he used that punch as a smasher out in California.

There will be no new punches in boxing until the general physical standards of the human biped are changed from their present state, and men are born with three arms instead of the current quota of two.

Tunney's liver punch is older than himself. Nevertheless it is a good punch. It was the punch that stopped Carpenter, or at least started him on his way.

And the starting punch is always the most important. Almost any sort to tap deftly placed will stop a fighter who is in distress.

Gibbons is both a body and a head puncher. Only enough, of his most effective punches is a carbon copy of Tunney's left to the liver.

"But I think my best punch really is a left hook to the jaw," Gibbons tells the writer. "It is mostly a dazer—but sometimes it drops them cold."

Gibbons thinks the hook is particularly adapted to his style of milling.

"The way I shoot the hook to the jaw is by keeping the left arm crooked as an angle sufficient to reach the opponent—the elbow on a parallel line with glove and hitting with the movement of the body, not the arm."

Gibbons says he didn't know he had a damaging hook until the night he fought Tony Melchior at Toledo.

"I hooked it to Tony's jaw in the first round and he dropped like a ton of wet cement. I think I was mazy stumped then he got up."

Incidentally that was the beginning of Gibbons' long string of knockouts that led to the Dempsey match in Montana.

"I consider the hook a great punch," resumes Gibbons, "because it is aimed at the most defenseless side of an opponent—the right jaw. The natural boxer stands so that his left side is protected by his left shoulder. But the right side is wide open and easy to hit."

Gibbons has hooked so much with both his right and left that neither of his arms is perfectly straight. There is a very marked curvature in both. You notice this particularly when you see him in street clothes.
