Remembering the great success achieved by Sarazen, Mrs. Whitney, in doubt, is playing a strong hunch.

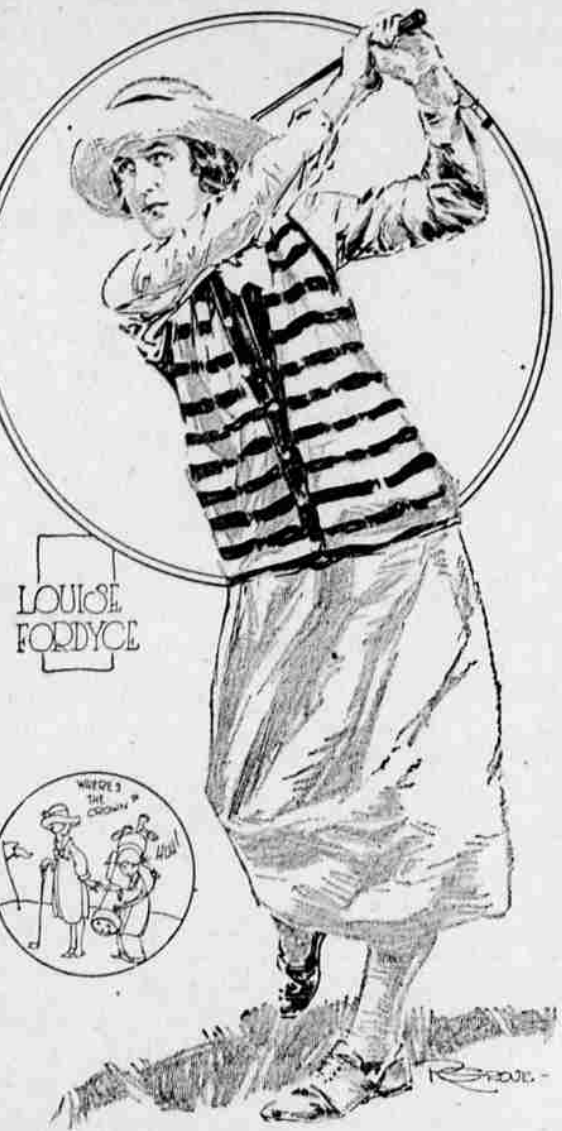
If Nurm, the horse, achieves the fame of Nava Nurm, the runner, a lot of turf records are certain to be shattered.

Everett Scott is Threatened by age

NEW YORK, May 2.—A new menace today threatens the playing record of the veteran Yankee shortstop, Everett Scott.

Victory over sickness, injury and transportation umps, of eleven years in the major leagues, Scott, who has established a mark of playing in more than 1300 consecutive games, may be compelled soon to bow to Father Time.

With the New York team steadily slipping—they dropped another one yesterday to the tail end Boston Red Sox, 7 to 5, word emanated from the Yankee camp that Manager Huggins is seriously considering the replacement of Scott by young Waininger, when the Yankees return to New York tomorrow to open a series with the Athletics.

Yankee followers point to the fact that Scott's work this year has evidenced unmistakable signs of slowing up in the field; his hitting has never been strong. Now, 33 years old, Scott is beginning to show the effects of his long career at a period when the New York team can ill afford it.

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SMITH'S TEAMS SET NEW GRID RECORD

CALIFORNIA, by going through five consecutive seasons without meeting defeat, hung up a modern football record in so far as big university eleven were concerned. Nothing to equal it has been put over in recent years. It stands out as the performance of a legend.

The nearest approach to the remarkable feat of the Smith school mark within the last 10 seasons or so was made by Cornell. The Ithaca team went pretty close to four years without a reverse, finally going down during the 1924 campaign.

Michigan under the superb tutelage of Yost and Little, skipped over three seasons without leaving the field on the short end of the score. Fact is, the Maize and Blue went just three years to the day defeating, losing to Ohio State, 14 to 0 on Oct. 22, 1921, and again on Oct. 8, 1924, to Illinois.

Marquette University also boasted a three-year streak sans defeat. But like Cornell and Michigan saw an end to the streak last fall.

Penn State, a couple of seasons back, had something like a mark of 30 consecutive triumphs, but the Nittany Lions were halted there.

Two of the best winning jamborees ever reported, however, belong to teams of 15 and 20 years ago.

One was made by Michigan. It covered a period of close to five years, the first whipping being administered in the final game of the fifth campaign.

From 1901 through 1904 the Wolverines copped every game. And they were playing between 11 and 12 contests a season then, too.

In 1905, however, Chicago stuck a huge knife into the record by trimming Michigan, 2 to 0, a bone-headed play preventing the Yostmen from gaining a tie.

During that five-year span the Maize and Blue won 55 games, lost one and tied one.

To Gil Dobie, better known as "Gloomy Gil," goes the honor of the longest winning career.

Dobie, now coaching Cornell, piloted his University of Washington eleven through nine successive campaigns without a blot. He was never beaten during all the time he tutored the northwest combination. This stands as the premier performance in gridiron history.

Bend Wins Central Oregon Track Meet

BEND, Ore., May 2.—Bend high school won the central Oregon track meet here yesterday for the first time in 12 years. Princeton was second and Redmond third. Princeton girls took one more point than Bend girls but the scores counted equally point for point with the boys.

The grade school track meet was won by Deschutes county pupils by a good margin.

Baseball Team is Formed by 'Y' Boys

First practice of the baseball team by members of the Y. M. C. A. was held yesterday evening, announced E. E. Hohlmann, coach and director of physical education at the "Y." Gene Eberhart was elected manager of the team, and arrangements made for practice every Thursday evening.

Games will be scheduled with baseball teams of the same class in surrounding communities, says Mr. Hohlmann, and it is hoped to have the opening game two weeks from today. Boys in this division of the Y. M. C. A. are from 13 to 16 years of age.
