JOHN STEVENSON APPOINTED JUDGE

SALEM, Ore., May 4. — John H. Stevenson of Portland was today appointed by Governor Pierce as a circuit judge for the fourth judicial district to succeed the late Judge Geo. W. Stapleton, whose death occurred last Friday. Under the law Judge Stevenson will hold office until his successor is elected and qualified by the general election of November, 1926. NATIVE OF OREGON PORTLAND, Ore., May 4. — John H. Stevenson came to Portland in the early 1900s. He became associated with the Evening Telegram as a cub reporter and feature writer. He studied law and in 1907 was appointed deputy district attorney. He served for one year and resigned to enter private practice. In 1913 he was appointed municipal judge by Mayor Albee. He introduced several innovations, among them a morals court designed to keep the morbidly curious from sitting in at trials. Stevenson was born in Forest Grove, December 28, 1878. His father, Robert O. Stevenson, was once state game warden.

Use of Gypsum on Building Growing

"Houses made fireproof by gypsum concrete walls" are described in the current issue of Popular Science Monthly. The magazine says: "Gypsum, commonly called 'plaster of Paris,' which has been used for centuries for plastering walls, is the essential part of a new fireproof building material. Mixed with cinders, gravel, crushed stone or furnace slag and poured in forms, it can be used to construct main walls and partitions of one and two story buildings. It is possible now to erect an entire house of this incombustible material at a cost that compares favorably with that of a wooden building. "While it takes ordinary concrete several days to harden, gypsum concrete will harden within 30 minutes. This speeds up construction work, lessening labor costs. Also, since the material sets so rapidly, a comparatively small number of forms can be used over and over as the walls go up. Another advantage is that gypsum is considerably lighter than other concrete."

Paraguay Points Way to Prosperity

BUENOS AIRES, May 4. — (AP) — The situation of Paraguay has undergone a vast change for the better, according to Dr. Manuel Benitez, minister of finance of that country, in an interview given out while on a recent visit to Buenos Aires. From a state of economic anarchy, the balance of trade is now in the country's favor. Its currency has been stabilized at a reasonable rate of conversion and its stock of gold is increasing. Paraguay, moreover, has balanced its budget and closed the last financial year with a surplus. Dr. Benitez is optimistic regarding the future because 100 per cent more cotton has been sown in Paraguay this year than last; tobacco bids fair to yield a record crop, the timber industry is flourishing, and political tranquillity seems to be assured.

Lease of Tri-Delt House is Announced

The house was formerly occupied by the Sigma Nu fraternity. The lease was handled through the W. R. Cooper realty office.

Esthonia Planning To pay her Debt To United States

WASHINGTON, May 4. — Negotiations for a debt funding agreement between the United States and Esthonia are being carried on between treasury and legation officials. Esthonia owes the United States between forty and fifty million dollars on advances made as a relief measure in 1919 and subsequent years. The British debt settlement forms the basis of discussion with the matter of a possible moratorium or reduced interest rate for the first years of payment the immediate question at issue.

Charles C. Hart Gains Appointment

WASHINGTON, May 4. — Charles C. Hart, Washington correspondent for the Portland Oregonian and a number of other western newspapers has been appointed minister to Albania to fill a long existing vacancy. Formal announcement of the appointment is withheld pending approval by the Albanian government. Mr. Hart is native of Indiana, 47 years old, and has had wide experience in the middle and far west. He was secretary and manager of the national republican progressive league seeking the election of Charles E. Hughes in 1916.

New Optical Unit Is Received Here

Installation of a new and improved type of refractory unit for his optometry parlors is announced by Dr. Royal Glick of Eugene. This new equipment is the first outfit of its kind ever brought to the Pacific coast, and represents an investment of \$2000. By means of the unit, the mechanism for testing eyes is brought on a swinging arm directly in front of the patient, who sits in a hydraulic chair. Dr. Glick's office has lately been remodeled in French gray and mahogany.

Kiwanians Hear of World Court Plan

An address on the world court by Dean W. G. Hale of the University of Oregon law school was the feature of today's luncheon meeting of the Kiwanis club. Dean Hale explained the

functions of the proposed court, and its suggested powers. He traced the development of legal methods for the settlement of disputes between individuals, cities and states. The world court will function as a sort of supreme court, to arbitrate and settle issues between nations, he said. Two new members were introduced, Donald McDonald, proprietor of the Rex and Lowell theaters, and Lawrence Menard of the Manerud-Huntington Hotel or maner. A vocal solo by Roy Bryson was the musical feature of the program, which was in charge of A. E. Bingham.

Drill pay for Company C of the national guard of this city has arrived and will be distributed to the command tomorrow evening, according to announcement today. Major Cleary, senior instructor of the national guard of the state, will be here at the drill period tomorrow night to inspect the local companies, according to announcement today of Major W. G. White, commander of the guard here. Enlistments for the guard units will soon be closed as every man to attend the camp in June must have completed all preliminary training, it is announced.

Two Killed When Car Takes Plunge

WENATCHEE, Wash., May 4. — Jess Walters, 18, Western Union office clerk, and Harold Jessup, 19, student, were killed, and J. C. Finley, aged 45; Farrell Palmer, 18, and Russell Jessup, 17, were injured in an automobile accident yesterday morning while on their way to Lake Chelan to spend the day fishing. Mr. Finley, the driver, suffered chest bruises and will live, Dr. R. T. Condon said today. The breaking of the steering gear in loose gravel is believed to have caused the wreck. The car plunged down a 40-foot grade. Palmer and Jessup suffered bruises and scratches.
