BUSINESS IN SOUTH AND EAST SLOWING

"Although business is fundamentally sound there has been a marked slowing up in activity in the south, the east and the middle west but this is not noted on the Pacific coast where indications are that normal conditions prevail," according to C. D. Rorer, president of the Bank of Commerce of this city, who has returned after attending the annual meeting of committees of the American Bankers Association held April 19 to 23 at Augusta, Georgia.

Mr. Rorer, member of the agricultural commission of the A. B. A., representing the twelfth federal reserve district, returned home by way of Washington, D. C. and while at the national capital conferred with W. M. Jardine, new secretary of agriculture in regard to cooperation of the national bankers with the agricultural department.

"I was surprised at the publicity that Eugene is receiving in many places," Mr. Rorer said, "especially along the Pacific coast in conversations among travelers this city is mentioned and much interest seems to be displayed concerning its present development," the banker states.

Mr. Rorer at New York met Mrs. Rorer and his family on their return after an extended European trip and they returned to their home here with him.

Anglers are Busy On Waters in Lane

Although a large number of anglers were out whipping the Lane county streams yesterday there was but little law violation and only one ardent fisherman was found not in possession of the necessary state license, according to Rodney Roach, deputy state game warden for this district. The fine weather drew many of the "part-time" anglers out, being those who like the sport under comfortable conditions but not enticed when the rain falls or the cold and chilly wind whips over the streams. The water is new clear in most of the Lane streams and the anglers report good catches in a majority of cases.

Fire Danger is Reported at Bend

BEND, Ore., May 4.—The humidity has dropped to 25 or five points below the danger point, according to H. L. Plumb, supervisor of the Deschutes national forest. Dry southeast winds are forecast by the weather bureau, these winds sweeping in from the high desert over the Fort Rock district of the forest will dry out the timber land very fast.

Tillamook Child Beater Enters Plea of Guilty

TILLAMOOK, Ore., May 4.—Mrs. M. C. Patton today pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of her grandchild, Sylvia Louise Desamps, aged 4, who died from the effects of a beating. She was immediately sentenced to an indefinite term in the state penitentiary not to exceed 15 years. She was arraigned on a charge of second degree murder and pleaded not guilty to that charge.

District Attorney Claude Harlick told the court that a plea of guilty to a charge of manslaughter would be acceptable, provided the maximum penalty would be pronounced. The child died April 21 last. She was the daughter of Mrs. Cora M. Desamps of Portland, who, following a divorce, sent her four children to reside with their grandmother.

Recruiting Officer Takes up Duties

Corporal Clifford E. Pritchett, United States army, arrived here yesterday to assume charge of the army recruiting office in the courthouse. Lawrence Paige, private first class, has been in charge of the station here for the past several weeks and he will remain here for a while before being transferred again to the Portland recruiting headquarters, it is announced. All branches of the army service are again open for enlistments, according to the report brought by Corporal Pritchett. The Eugene office has obtained a large number of recruits during the past year placing it as one of the best of the stations for its size on the coast.

Motions Filed in Stephenson Case

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 4.—Motions to strike out certain portions of the indictment charging D. C. Stephenson with first degree murder in connection with the death of Miss Madge Oberholzer were filed in criminal court today by Eph Inman, Stephenson's attorney. The motions provided a plea by Stephenson to the indictment.

BUILDING RECORD

TODAY IS \$47,700

Another record day in building permits was experienced today by W. H. Alexander, city building inspector, who issued permits for new buildings aggregating \$47,700 in value.

The new Delta Delta Delta sorority, 1088 University street, will be erected at an approximate cost of \$35,000. It was taken out the permit. A. W. Elmscher was granted permits to build six new dwellings on a bungalow court at 2024 Emerald street. These homes are designated by letters, and the cost of their construction is as follows:

Bungalow A, \$1300; B, \$1300; C, \$1100; D, \$1300; E, \$1300; F, \$1300. A warehouse and garage will be built by Darling and Babo at 1103 Willamette street, at a cost of \$2000, according to the permit issued for the building.

Other permits granted were: Roy Stien, public meat stalls, \$2500, Eighth avenue east. Fred Terry, \$400 cottage, 1354 Seventh avenue west. Ray R. Dean, \$200 remodeling of the Club cigar store, 814 Willamette street.

Rail Report Made By J. Kruttschnitt On Natron Cutoff

Reporting on the progress of the Natron cutoff construction, involving the building of 107.75 miles of main line and 29 miles of sidings over the Cascade mountains between Kirk and Oakridge, Julius Kruttschnitt, retiring chairman of the Southern Pacific executive committee, says that all of the right-of-way has been acquired and contracts let for the construction of the entire line.

Of the 62.72 miles still to be completed all the right-of-way has been cleared, 31 miles have been graded ready for ties and rails, and the grading and tunnel work on the remaining 31.72 miles of line is progressing.

This report was received today and made public by L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific railroad. With the completion of this and other construction jobs now in hand, the Southern Pacific company will operate and control some 16,000 miles of rail line and 825 miles of water lines.

Equipment for two Schools is Planned

Equipment of the two new junior high schools for the city of Eugene will be purchased during the summer by the school board, according to the announcement of O. H. Jones, secretary of the board. Bids will be called for on desks, tables, chairs, and necessary school equipment, and considered by the board at a special meeting for the purpose.

If Eugene grows at the rate it has in the last year, it may be necessary to utilize rooms in the new junior high school buildings for housing overflow students in grammar school grades, says Joseph T. Glenn, city superintendent of schools. Despite the fact that the new buildings are being relief from the crowded conditions of last year, it is quite possible that the increase will be as great this fall, if new homes erected the first four months of the present year are any indication of new families moving to the city.

Election to fill one vacancy on the Eugene school board will be held early in June and it is certain that John T. Evans, present member of the board, will be a candidate to succeed himself, according to friends here, although Mr. Evans has made no announcement as to his plans. Mr. Evans was elected last June to fill for the one-year term. This will be the only place for the electors as the other four members of the board hold over.

The terms of Frederick G. Jennings, chairman, and Willard A. Elkins expire in June 1926 and W. F. Reed and C. W. Mullen retire in June 1927. As the present board has worked in harmony during the past year, and there are no indications of any dissatisfaction with results it is expected that school election will be devoid of the exciting interest that marked the event last June when recalls were also voted on as well as the selection of a board member.
