MOOR MURDER CONFESSION IS GIVEN BACKING
Jealousy of Wife Ascribed As Motive; Would Have Her in Prison

Sacramento Police Report Murder Took Effect as Moor Has Related
SALEM, Ore., May 5.—Jealousy, inspired by the belief that his wife was running around the country and enjoying herself while he is confined to state prison here, is believed by prison officials to be the motive behind the confession of C. R. Moor, convict, that he shot and killed Harry Brown, of Sacramento, during an attempted highway robbery near Sacramento in September, 1923.

Insanely Jealous. Moor, the prison authorities say, is insanely jealous of his wife, and when she visited him at the prison last Friday to inform him that she would have to go to Portland to secure employment, he flew into a rage and declared he would tell everything in prison to her. According to Moor's confession his wife drove the car in which they escaped from the scene of the murder.

First Fund Received. With the receipt of \$4,125.54 by Mrs. Ward, county treasurer, the first turnover of forest sale funds of \$100,000 for the year ending June 30, 1924, has been completed, according to announcement of the treasurer today. This sum represents 25 per cent of the total sales of government timber in Lane county during the year ended. This is the largest single turnover of federal money to the county in its history.

County Agent Has Busy Time
Reports for the month of April prepared by O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent, show that a total of 340 people called at the office in the county house in April. Twenty-two meetings for farmers were held in the county in the month with a total attendance of 555, the report shows.

Beef Cattle try Dynamite Diet; 4 of Best Dead
MEDFORD, Ore., May 5.—E. R. Day, a rancher in the Sams valley district found four of his best beef cattle dead on the range a few days ago and reported the matter to State Veterinarian W. H. Lytle of Salem who came down and after an autopsy, declared the animals had been killed by eating dynamite. The wrappings on the dynamite with the makers' name plainly visible were found in the stomachs of the dead steers.

SALEM, Ore., May 5.—Mrs. C. A. Paton, aged Tillamook woman, was received at the state penitentiary last night to begin serving time for manslaughter. Mrs. Paton was convicted of causing the death of her granddaughter by beating the child so severely with a strap that she died. The woman was much dejected when received at the prison and had nothing to say. She was turned over to the warden of the prison and is imprisoned with three other women state prisoners and eight federal female prisoners that are now in the penitentiary.

ATTACK WILL BE OPENED AT THREE POINTS
Aviators Report on Activity Of Rebel Tribesmen in Morocco
Uprising of Local Tribesmen Thought to be Aim Of Rebel Leader

FEZ, Morocco, May 5.—(AP)—The Riffians are preparing to attack the French forces at three principal points, it was reported today by French aviators after General Colombat's column had engaged the invaders near Djebel Bihani to relieve French outposts still surrounded by the tribesmen.

Offensive Opened. Today's French offensive in the Djebel Bihani region was intended to keep open the territory around the French advanced posts rather than to force a decisive combat. Most of the outposts have now been freed from envelopment by the Riffians.

Circus Man Dies in Fall
COTTAGE GROVE, May 5.—(Special)—Wesley Alloway of 692 Ash street, Portland, with the cook force of the A. G. Barnes circus, fell from the cook car and was instantly killed at 11 o'clock this morning. His body is at the morgue awaiting the coroner from Eugene.
