EVANGELIST VISITS ARE SUCCESS HERE
Dr. A. Earl Kernahan, director of visitation evangelism, is directing the Presbyterian congregation and Methodist Episcopal churches in a campaign here. He arrived Sunday, launching the campaign at 2:30 Sunday afternoon. Dr. Kernahan is the originator of this method which is known all over America as "visitation evangelism." It is a careful application of the principles of psychology and humanism to the presentation of the claims of Christ upon life. Dr. Kernahan has demonstrated from coast to coast. He has directed campaigns in Boston, Hartford, Providence, Rochester, Baltimore, Chicago, Des Moines, Omaha and Riverside, California. He has directed many colleges and universities. Recently he directed Brown university, Providence, R. I. Next fall he will direct Columbia university, University of Pennsylvania and several other institutions of higher learning. There have been 20,542 people won to Christ and the church in the last 15 1/2 months of his work. There have been more people received into church membership due to Dr. Kernahan's campaigns during the last 12 months than have been received from the work of any other religious worker in America. He has established a record for speaking. He has averaged seven addresses per Sunday since September. The campaign here is highly successful. The workers are enthusiastic. Eighty-three people were won in one evening's work. The second worker's supper and conference will be held at 8 o'clock this evening at the First Methodist Episcopal church.
