

### OREGON STUDENTS TO NAME OFFICERS

### MOTHERS' DAY IS GIFT-GIVING TIME

Mother's Day this year will probably be more widely celebrated than ever before, according to Eugene merchants. Observation of the day has grown more and more into the form of gifts and remembrances and everything from flowers to automobiles is suggested by local shops as a means of honoring the mothers in whose honor the day is named.

The house and senate of the United States passed a resolution 12 years ago, as a result of the spread of the Mothers' Day idea, and purpose, making the day a national holiday "dedicated to the memory of the best mother in the world, your mother."

It is now the accepted custom to wear a pink carnation or flower if the mother is living, and a white one, if she is dead. Eugene florists report the largest advance orders of flowers in history, and popularity of the custom of "saying it by telegraph" is shown in the number of telegraphic orders being handled by the floral firms. Western Union is offering a service in the form of appropriately-worded greetings, and special rates for Mother's Day telegrams. Electric and labor-saving equipment for the home, radios sets and furniture have been suggested.

Candy is also becoming a popular gift. Every Eugene confectionery is advertising special boxes, one of the most favorite styles being in the shape of a bound book, entitled "Mother," which when opened, reveals a layer of high grade candy. Verses and cards may be enclosed with these boxes, and they may either be sent by the local firm direct by mail, or telegraphed for delivery on Mother's Day, the same as flowers.

### Community Meeting Date is Scheduled

Arrangements for the last community meeting until next fall after school, will be held at the Triangle consolidated school Friday May 22, according to word received today at the office of E. J. ### Report on County Farm is Prepared

There were 25 inmates at the Lane county farm during April, 23 men and two women, according to the monthly report of Victor Hoare, superintendent, submitted to Judge C. P. Harnard of the county court. Figures on the total produce of the farm for the month show that very little food has to be purchased. More than 75 gallons of milk were consumed in the month and 12 dozen eggs, these were all home products at the farm, the report shows. Four sack of potatoes were used and 35 pounds of butter. A total of 205 loaves of bread were purchased for the use of the farm during the month and 35 pounds of coffee.

### New Plumbing is Planned for Jail

Plans were discussed by the county court today for the installation of new plumbing in the county jail as the present system is in need of considerable repair. It is estimated that the necessary work will cost about \$150 members of the court state. The jail at present is not in the best of sanitary condition and the new plumbing is needed at once, according to Sheriff Frank E. Taylor.

### Headquarters for Scouts Arranged

Headquarters for the Lane county council of the Boy Scouts will be established in an office in the city hall on the second floor opposite the offices of the Eugene school board. Arrangements for the use of the city hall quarters were completed today and C. H. Clark, new scout executive in Lane, will take possession within the next few days. A schedule of office hours will be arranged as soon as the office is taken over, Mr. Clark states.
