new line in central Oregon, was filed today with the interstate commerce commission by the Oregon Trunk rail-road, a corporation controlled by the Northern Pacific-Great Northern-Burlington group. No estimates of cost were included.

From Bend South.—The projected line will run from Bend, Oregon, in a general southerly direction 170 miles to Klamath Falls, via Bonanza and Olean. In addition, 80 miles of additional main line would be built through northward from Klamath Falls along the west side of Klamath lake and returning to the main trunk again at a junction point called Skookum.

The line would open an avenue of transportation for very large timber tracts, the application said, and in addition would be some traffic from agricultural and grazing interests. It was further said that the Oregon Trunk was affiliated with other railroads which operate 27,000 miles of line and that these corporations were prepared to finance the extension.

Petition Pending.—There is pending before the commission a petition by the Oregon public utilities commission which asks that railroads serving Oregon be required to build a large amount of new extensions in the central and eastern sections of that state. The Oregon Trunk proposal filed today in part covers the routes on which the Oregon commission has sought to force new construction.

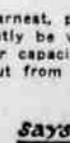

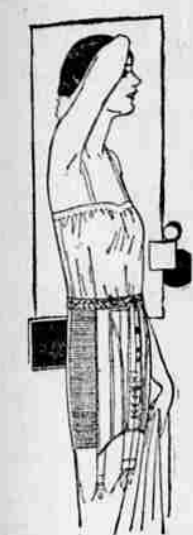
