

### CORVALLIS MAKES READY FOR GOLF TOURNEY SUNDAY

CORVALLIS, May 8.—(Special)—Golfers of the Corvallis country club are getting ready for the first of a series of three matches between country clubs of Corvallis, Salem and Eugene to be held at Salem Sunday. The Sunday following the matches will be played at Eugene and the tri-state tournament will wind up with the competition on the Corvallis links May 21.

This tournament started four years ago. Eugene and Corvallis each winning two legs on the Tri-City tournament cup. The first club to win it three times will get the cup permanently.

Corvallis golfers have been practicing earnestly the last few weeks and recently they registered a win over Oregon City. A return engagement will be at Oregon City in June. Corvallis will play the Rose City and East Portland clubs and also is discussing for matches with the Tualatin country club and the new Alderwood golf club. The club has already arranged a match with the Roseburg country club for next month, although no definite date has been set.

Roy Moe of Oregon Agricultural college seems to be the best bet of the Corvallis country club. Moe is one of the best players ever returned out at the Portland municipal links and when right is hard to beat. He is consistent and has a powerful drive.

Hayward will enter teams in four events, the half-mile, mile, two-mile, and four-mile relays.

The quarter-mile team, which early in the season, seemed about the strongest part of the relay squad, has disintegrated. Two of the four sprinters, Westerner and Extra are on the hospital list, Holt was posted and Stonebreaker has done little running recently.

The other teams, however, seem well balanced. Some of them bettered the marks made at the Washington relays last year, and practice.


