

GEORGE BRONAUGH RESIGNS AS GOLF COACH AT OREGON

George Bronaugh, golf coach at the University of Oregon, today turned in his resignation to Jack Benefield, graduate manager. Bronaugh has coached the Oregon squad for two years and also has been one of its leading players. Two years ago at Seattle he was runner up to Champion Jack Westland of University of Washington.

Bronaugh quit school early in the spring, but continued to coach the squad. Coaching, however, has been up his afternoons and for that reason he decided to resign. He has been instrumental all year in trying to gain recognition for golf from the student body.

Bill McBride, captain of the team, probably will act as instructor also. McBride is one of the leading players on the campus.

Oregon will send a four-man team to Portland to take part in the coast conference championships. The team will be led by the Portland golf club links May 21 and 22.

Ty Cobb Leads his League in Batting

CHICAGO, May 9.—(AP)—As the clubs of the National league swing into the sixth week of the pennant race, Jack Fournier, first baseman with Brooklyn, today is leading the pack for batting honors with the remarkable average of .500, with Roger Hornsby of the Cardinals, 1924 batting champion snapping at his heels with .449.

"Gabby" Hartnett, peppery catcher with the Cubs, continues to set the pace for home run hitters leading with eight.

Ty Cobb, veteran pilot of the Detroit Tigers and holder of more records than any player who ever donned a major league uniform, is leading the American league batters with an average of .525. In his remarkable hitting spree, Cobb crashed over five homers in two consecutive days. He chalked up six consecutive hits the first day and then bagged three more the next.

ASTORIA, Ore., May 9.—Seventy-five bankers, representing group one of the state bankers' association, went into session for their annual meeting here today. Prominent bankers from the nine northwestern counties of Oregon are present. Among the outside guests are J. N. Calkins of San Francisco, Governor of the Federal Reserve district, and D. M. Ambrose, cashier of the Federal Reserve bank at San Francisco. This morning C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter, reviewed for the convention the recent legislative session from the point of view of banking.

The afternoon will be spent golfing and at the banquet tonight the group will elect officers for the coming year.

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JUDICIAL COUNCIL CLOSES MEETING

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9.—The judicial council on revision of court procedure closed its session with the Oregon and Multnomah Bar associations yesterday without doing anything definite about the chief proposal—to adopt for state courts the federal court system of having the judge examine prospective jurors.

The matter is expected to come up again when the council meets again in August.

The council, on recommendation of the Oregon association, adopted three proposals:

1.—That the power to establish rules for the courts to be taken away from the legislature and given to the supreme court.

2.—That until this is done, discussion be limited to means of putting reforms under existing rules.

3.—That all practicing attorneys be required to be members of the Oregon Bar association.

The meeting favored putting a constitutional amendment on the ballot, in November, 1926, to effect the first proposal.

Weather at Relay Carnival Perfect

SEATTLE, May 9.—(AP)—Weather for the University of Washington relay carnival in the stadium here this afternoon was announced as "very nearly perfect" by M. B. Summers, observer stationed in Seattle.

For those watching a program featuring a mile race between Joie Ray and Hay Dodge both of the Illinois Athletic club, Chicago, Summers pronounced the temperature "just right for the spectators." A light wind from the north was noted and the ground was drying from a heavy rain that fell yesterday. Dodge holds the stadium record for the half mile, 1:56 4-5.
