Referendum Lists Filed With Clerk

Five petitions on the referendum on the motor bus bill were filed today with the county clerk for checking of signatures before they are turned over to the secretary of state. The petitions contain nearly 250 names all from Lane county. All Lane county signatures on the petitions must be checked to ascertain if they are legal voters before the names are declared valid. A large number of other petitions are in circulation but the five today are the first to be filed for checking.

Work on Bridges Gets Under way

Work on the erection of three piling bridges on the Ferguson road and four bridges on the Alvord road is under way by the county road crews, according to Clinton Hurd, county commissioner, who with O. S. Callison has inspected the sites. These bridges will vary in length from 16 feet to 45 feet and will be built on piles to replace several spans that are at present in need of repair, the commissioner states. The county bridge crews are also at work repairing about 2000 feet of plank road at Acme.

\$200 FOR ESSAY PRIZES OFFERED

Students of Eugene schools have an opportunity to win a share of the \$200 in cash prizes offered for the best essay written by high school and grade school students in the prize essay contest to be conducted between now and September 15 by the All-Oregon 1925 Exposition committee, according to an announcement made today from the University of Oregon.

Contestants will write on one of two general subjects: (1) Oregon-made products, or (2) the educational and cultural values of art. These subjects were deemed appropriate inasmuch as the All-Oregon 1925 Exposition, to be held in Portland, Oct. 5 to 10, will feature Oregon-made goods. The exposition itself is planned to promote the cause of art in Oregon.

The state prizes are as follows:

The high school contest: \$50 for first place; \$30 for second place, and \$20 for third place.
Grade school contest: \$50 for first place; \$30 for second place and \$20 for third place.

Essays must be confined in a general way to the two subjects mentioned above: (1) Oregon-made products, or (2) the educational and cultural values of art, but the contestant may choose his own title and, of course, his subject matter so long as they fall within one of the two headings mentioned. The committee suggests the following titles as an example of what is desired:

1. The Economic Importance of Oregon-Made Goods.
2. Oregon's Basic Industries and Their Relation to the Welfare of the State.
3. The Value of a State-Wide Oregon Products Exposition.
4. Art as an Expression of the Characteristic Culture of a State.
5. Art as an Essential in the Education of a People.
6. The Value of an Oriental Art Exhibit to the Pacific Coast.

The essays must be in the hands of the secretary of the All-Oregon 1925 Exposition committee, 631 Court House, Portland, Ore., not later than September 15.

The contest judges are: Judge Charles H. Carey, former president of the Oregon Writers' league and author and historian; Anthony Fowler, poet and illustrator, and Dean Eric W. Allen of the University of Oregon school of journalism.

Clover Experiments Are Carried out

Experiments with the planting of Ladino clover, a species of white clover but larger and better for forage, will be made at the farm of J. A. Furnish in the Ada district on Fiddle creek, according to announcement today of O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent, who has received a supply of the seed from the Broadway ranch at Springfield, Idaho. The new clover is an Italian species and is sometimes called mammoth white clover. Mr. Furnish will plant two acres of the clover and if it proves successful it is expected that there will be a large planting of this in Western Lane as the conditions are said to favor this, the county agent states.

Commission Fixes Freight Rate List

SALEM, Ore., May 9.—For the first time in the history of the public service commission a schedule of freight rates for truck lines has been fixed by an order of the commission. The order affects about 90 fee hire truck operators hauling wood shipments on the John Day and tributary highways in eastern Oregon. For hauls of 25 miles or under a rate of 1 1/2c per hundred pounds per mile was fixed, with one cent for shorter hauls. Rates on unimproved highways are one half cent higher. Trucks of less than two tons capacity will have a rate of \$2 an hour and larger trucks \$2.50 an hour.
