Play Given by Club Is Colorful and Pleasing Event

Fairly sparkling with charm, uniqueness, and delightfulness, perhaps no club event of the year has attained the distinctive interest of the play "Twelfth Night," as presented by members of the Shakespeare club at the Elks temple Tuesday evening for a party of invited friends. The club had planned nothing pretentious and elaborate as the play was given as a part of the organization's study of Shakespeare and his work, but it was exquisitely done and fine in every detail, and to Mrs. Lettie Mowrey must go much credit for the perfection attained. The costumes were gorgeous and in excellent taste. Mrs. Frederick G. Jennings as Viola did a delightful role. Mrs. Idaho Campbell as the sea-captain and later as Antonio did talented work. Mrs. Ernest Gilstrap was Maria, gentle-woman to Olivia, and her voice was lovely. To Miss Anne Whitaker and Mrs. Frederick S. Dunn are given the honors for the delightful humor of the play. Miss Whitaker as Sir Toby, always drunk, and uncle to Olivia, did her swag and talk in a fine manner, and not at all exaggerated. The poise and dignity of Mrs. Dunn as Sir Andrew Aguecheek, friend of Sir Toby, while, of course, humorously done, were well done. The two kept the spectators chuckling. Mrs. Henry Tromp as Orsino, Duke of Illyria, had rather a difficult role but did it perfectly, and with much pomp and grandeur. Mrs. E. B. Parks as Olivia, a great lady of Illyria, had one of the more pleasing roles of the play and was truly charming. Her costume was lovely. A particularly fine scene was that between Sebastian and Antonio in act two. Mrs. O. R. Gullion as Sebastian, twin brother of Viola, has a beautiful voice and it was a delight to hear her. Mrs. W. K. Newell made a most imposing person in the character of an officer. Shakespeare club has never before given an affair of this sort, but the play as given was a decided success and greatly appreciated by the hundred or more invited guests.
