ORGANIZATION OF DISTRICT FAVORED

Organization of a joint school district between Lane and Benton counties was authorized at the meeting of the Lane county board this morning. This new district will include part of district 154 in Lane and district 25 in Benton county. The remainder of district 154 in Lane will be added to district 27 at Liberty, according to action of the board.

The consolidation of district 152 with district 90 in Lane county was authorized following the result of an election held in the districts last fall. District 152 known as the Green Leaf district is now abolished. The petition to have a small part of district 13 added to district 9 at Goshen was dismissed by the board as the clerk of the school board in district 13 had not received an affidavit of the posting of the notices. This is the second time that this petition has been held up owing to failure to conform to legal points of the school rules.

REV. DUNHAM WILL STAND BY DECISION

Rev. Charles E. Dunham, pastor of the First Baptist church here for the past eight years, will stand by his resignation submitted at the recent annual meeting of the church board and plans to leave the church the latter part of June, according to announcement made to his congregation here.

The resignation will be acted on by the church board at a meeting to be held next Thursday evening. Mr. Dunham today stated that as he has been here eight years that he believed that a change should be made. "I guess that I am just restless. No plans have been made for the future but I will look around for another church," Mr. Dunham said.

Prominent members of the congregation are strong in their praise of Mr. Dunham and in the hope that he would reconsider his resignation. Mr. Dunham speaks in the highest terms of his treatment by the congregation.

General Hammond is Guest of Kiwanians

General Creed C. Hammond, head of the militia bureau of the United States war department at Washington, D. C., was introduced at today's meeting of the Kiwanis club by H. S. Bryson, chairman of the program committee. General Hammond spoke briefly on his work in Washington, and made particular reference to the economies effected by President Coolidge by pruning the national budget.

Mrs. T. A. Pearson was the vocal soloist at the luncheon, and was accompanied by Mrs. Ruth Davis Cleaver.

Today's assembly was dedicated to Mother's day, and Rev. Fred J. Clark, pastor of the Congregational church, delivered the address. He made a stirring plea for giving motherhood a more important place in the life of the nation. The luncheon was held at the Osburn hotel.

Lyle F. L. Weddle Dies at Hospital

Lyle F. L. Weddle, aged 20 years, of Jefferson, died here today, May 11, at the Northwest hospital. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Weddle, one brother Leo Weddle and one sister, Helene Weddle, all of Jefferson. The funeral will be held at the Christian church at Jefferson, Wednesday, May 13, at 2:30 p. m. Rev. Hugh McCollum will officiate. Interment will be at Albany. Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Veatch chapel of this city.

Concrete Pipe is Up Before Council

Definite approval of concrete pipe for the south Willamette sewer line to be built by Oscar Snow, and decision on a petition asking for restoring the appropriation for the U. S. employment office are the chief items of business before the city

council, meeting in its first session of May at the city hall tonight.

Petitions have also been filed for the opening of sixteenth avenue from the alley between Olive and Charnolton streets to Lincoln streets. The council will also pass on a request to vacate the part of block B between blocks one and two of Hurd's addition to Eugene.

Four ordinances are to be considered, adopting the report of the city viewers on opening extension and establishment of the following streets: Tenth avenue west from Polk to Chambers; Tyler from Fifth avenue to Sixth avenue; Thirteenth avenue from Jefferson to Madison; and Fifteenth avenue from Lawrence west to the east line of Hollenbeck's addition.

COUNCIL URGED TO AID LABOR OFFICE

Petitions bearing the names of more than 100 Eugene citizens, asking that the city restore its appropriation to the support of the United States employment office in Eugene, will be presented to the city council tonight. The council withdrew its financial support of the office recently as an economy measure.

The government will also withdraw its appropriation for maintaining the office if the city continues to withhold its aid, it has been definitely learned. As this is the most critical season of the year from the lumber mill and logging camp viewpoint, lack of an employment office will prove a big municipal liability, according to the petitioners.

The petition, it is understood, contains names of leading business men and industries in the city. It is asked that the council take definite action on the problem, and not postpone it until another meeting, as the office is likely to be closed immediately unless some assurance can be given that it will be financed.

J. E. Martin, grand master of the Council of Master Masons of Oregon, was a visitor in Eugene today, and was a guest at the noon luncheon of the Kiwanis club. J. H. Richmond, general secretary of the same organization, was expected to arrive in the city this afternoon.

The two will be joined by E. F. Catelet, principal conductor of work in the order, and will leave for Medford tonight, where they will install a council tomorrow night.

Erection of new \$50,000 sorority home for the Kappa Kappa Gamma organization is proposed at 821 Fifteenth avenue east, according to a building permit taken out today by McHolland brothers, at the office of W. H. Alexander, city inspector of buildings.

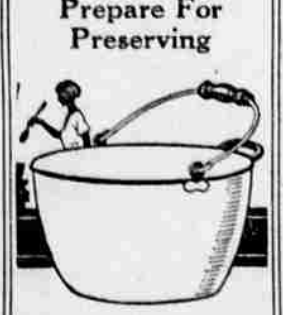
