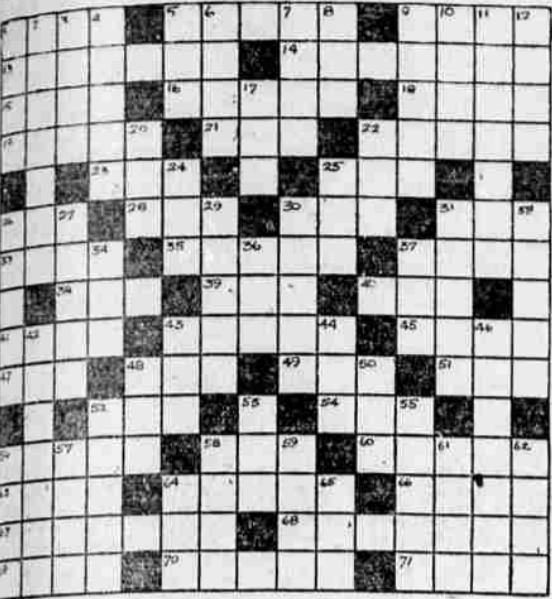


Today's Cross-Word Puzzle

There isn't a two-lettered word in this entire puzzle. But there are plenty of three-lettered words. And for variety's sake, there are four, five and six-lettered words.

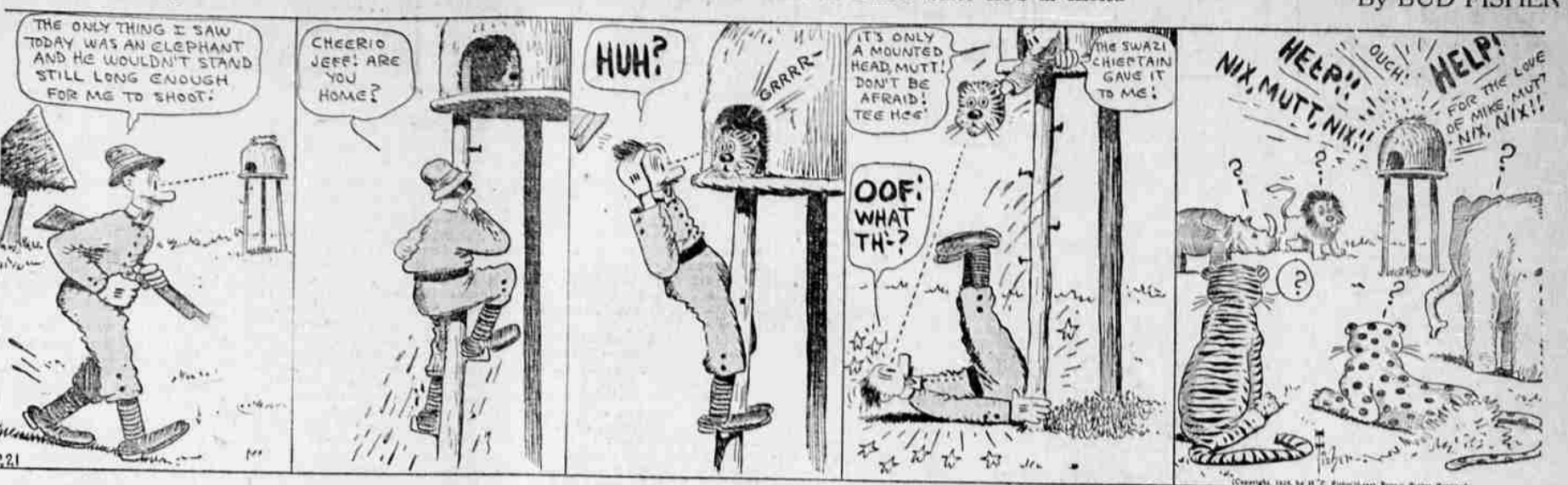

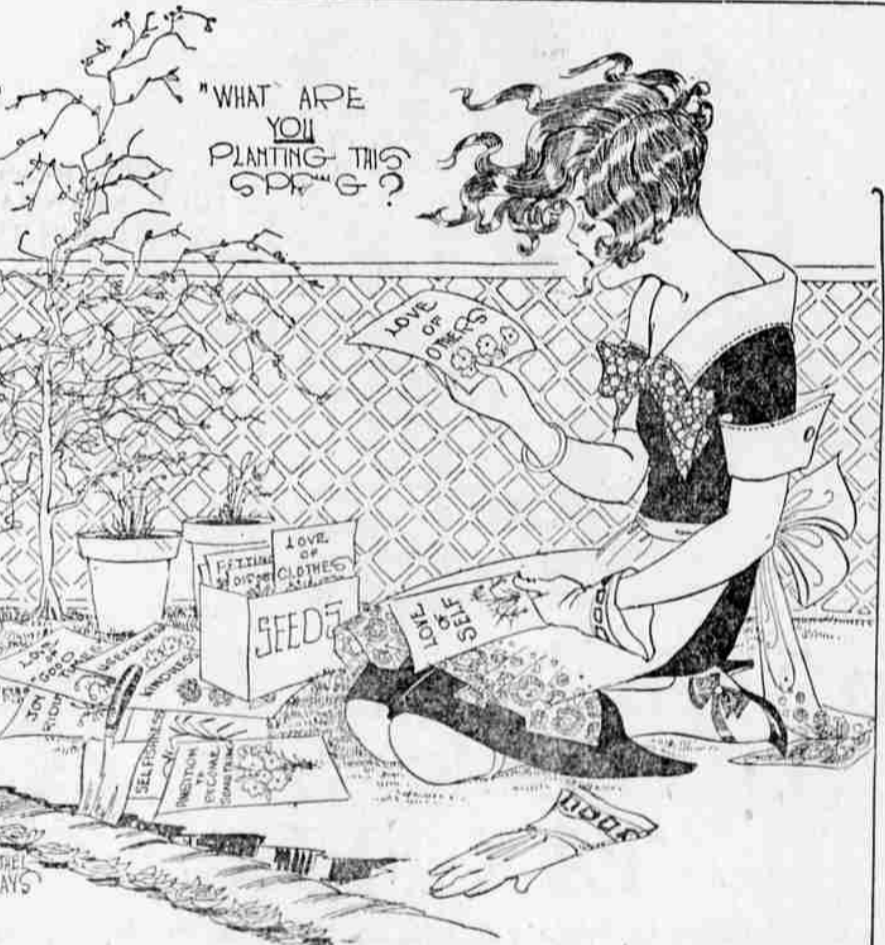

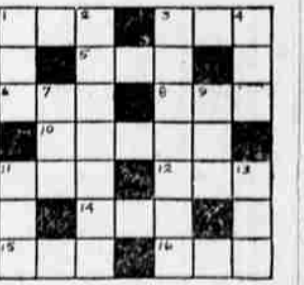
