

STANLEY'S TRADE IN MONTH \$40,000

End of the first month's business of the new Stanley store at Tenth and Olive streets this week shows a volume of business of approximately \$40,000, announces George C. Stanley, proprietor. This figure, he states, is grocery business only, and does not include the meat department or bakery department.

Mr. Stanley believes he has done the biggest one-month's business of any grocery store on the Pacific coast, and the fact that this immense volume of trade was handled at an average cost of less than 7 per cent makes the achievement noteworthy. "Business has been so far above what I expected that I expect to hold a bargain sale, and share the profits on the month's business with our customers," says Mr. Stanley. "In this sale we expect to price groceries far below the average groceryman's cost price."
