

AUTO COLLISIONS IN CITY INCREASE

An increase in automobile accidents in Eugene the last few days has resulted in a statement by A. H. Shorter, traffic officer. Many of the accidents could be avoided, he says, if motorists will signal with their hand when driving away from the curb, and by looking to see if any automobile is approaching.

"Left hand turns or complete turns at intersections should be avoided during Saturday night congestion on Willamette street," says Mr. Shorter. "These cause much of our traffic snafus."

"Warm clothes have to do double duty in Armenia," says Mr. Getchell, "not only must they keep out the wintry winds and snows out of doors, but inside the house they are called upon to replace furnaces. For every day is 'heatless' day in many of the near east relief orphanages. So scarce is fuel that only the hospital has any artificial heat at all."

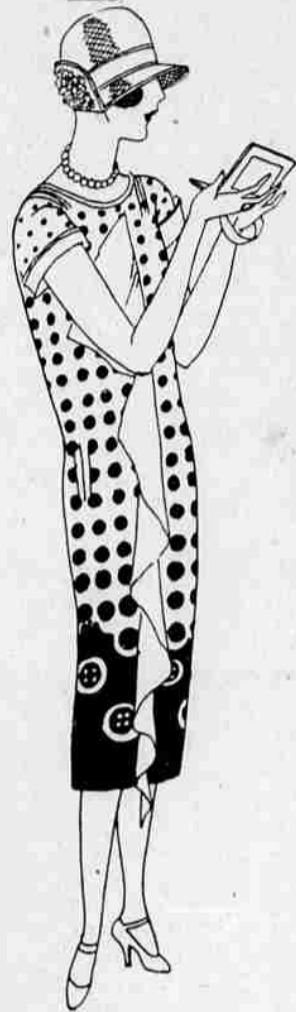
