

BUDGET OF SCHOOL BOARDS EXPLAINED

Information on the preparations of the budgets for the school districts of the third class has been received at the office of E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools. More than 170 of 194 school districts of Lane are in this class which consists of districts that have a school population of less than 200 children between the ages of 4 and 20 years.

The budget instructions received from the state department of education are in pamphlet form and contain full information on the requirements.

The legislative session of this year passed a law that exempts districts of the third class from the operations of the local budget law.

Briefly the procedure for voting taxes in districts of the third class is as follows:

- 1-Preparation of the "Notice of school meeting and budget" by the board of directors.
- 2-Posting of the budget for a period of ten days in three conspicuous places in the district, one of which shall be on the door of the school building.
- 3-If a newspaper is published in the district, the clerk must cause the budget to be published for at least two weeks before the meeting.

When it is proposed to exceed the six per cent limitation in districts of the third class, in addition, three copies of the "Notice of school election to increase the tax more than six per cent" must be posted and advertised for a period of two weeks in a newspaper, if there is one published in the district. In all elections to exceed the tax levy more than six per cent, there will be two questions voted on:

- 1-Whether the tax levy is to be increased more than six per cent over that of the preceding year.
- 2-The adoption of the budget, or, in other words, the levy of the tax.

FIR LOGGING FOR YEAR SETS RECORD

Logging operations in west coast districts from southern Oregon to the Canadian border, last year logged more than seven and one-half billion feet, woods scale, according to figures just compiled by the Four L Bulletin, official publication of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen.

The totals for the various logging centers are given as follows: North Puget Sound, 375,074,000 feet; Central Puget Sound, 1,327,352,171 feet; South Puget Sound, 1,137,480,165 feet; Grays Harbor and district, 908,565,092 feet; Willapa Harbor, 169,588,004 feet; Centralia-Chehalis district, 480,443,075 feet; Columbia river Washington side, 382,848,000 feet; Columbia river, Oregon side, 840,011,958 feet; Tillamook Line and North Oregon coast, 295,783,908 feet; Willamette valley, 651,713,218 feet; Coos Bay and South Oregon coast, 439,484,912 feet.

Truck loggers on Puget Sound were responsible for 150,000,000 feet of logs during the year. Imports of logs from British Columbia totaled 207,861,000 feet.

The 4L survey which for the greater part was compiled from figures supplied directly by individual operators, has been published in booklet form. It gives output of 300 major logging operations in Oregon and Washington, names of managers and superintendents, and addresses of both camps and offices. In addition the directory contains a list of 310 sawmills of Oregon, Washington and Idaho and their individual cuts for 1924. The 4L directory is being furnished at cost, according to the publishers, and may be had from their office, 500 Concord Building, Portland.

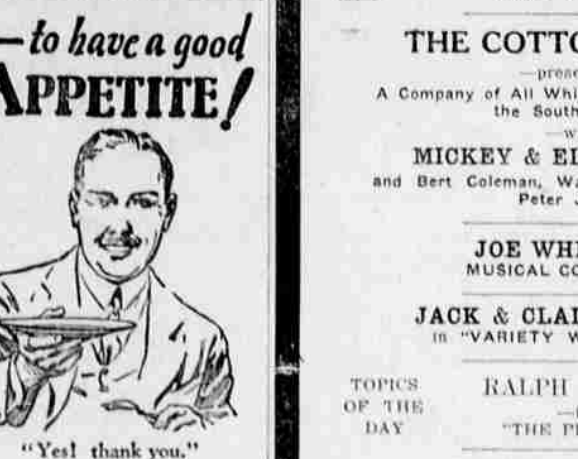
A marriage license was issued by the county clerk for George Oliver Yoran and Louise J. Mink, both of Eugene.

WOMEN'S COUNCIL TO BE EXCLUSIVE

WASHINGTON, May 13—(AP)—Led by the American delegation, the International Council of Women at its special open session today voted against permitting other international organizations to affiliate with it. The vote was 112 to 21, a two-thirds majority being necessary under the council's constitution for adoption.

Professor Marin P. Whitney of Vassar college, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., chairman of the council's education committee declared affiliation of other international groups would destroy the unity of effort of the council by creating a knowledge organization.

Lady Aberdeen, the council president, read a list of 30 international bodies that might affiliate including the International Federation of University Women, the Salvation army and International Peace bureau.

RUM RUNNERS ON COAST GET BUSY

and seeing that drug stores obey the law in dispensing medicinal liquor.

E. C. Yellowley, chief of the general prohibition agents, will be in command of the "first field army." He has been placed in control of the consolidating raiding forces assigned to New York, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and California.

CANADIANS ACTIVE

NEW YORK, May 13.—Because of the blockade of rum row, liquor smugglers working along the Canadian border are increasing their activities.

A Dunkirk, New York newspaper, tells of 350 cases of liquor landed at the mouth of Canadaway creek and carried away by more than a dozen trucks.

In Detroit prohibition agents have raided a two-story building with equipment for bottling liquor. More than 5,000 gallons of liquor were confiscated.

Meanwhile rum row still displays some life. Yesterday a big French steamer dropped anchor and was promptly surrounded by four coast guard boats. A German steamer which left the row in Monday morning's fog reappeared and anchored near the Frenchman.

Isolated cases of blockade-running have developed. Fifty cases of whiskey are reported to have landed at Seabright, N. J., yesterday. The New York American today publishes a story by Norman Hall in which he asserts that he came in on a boat which landed 115 cases of whiskey within the limits of Manhattan. He says that he believes much more

whiskey was brought ashore at the same time.

Ten cutters, three former destroyers and 27 picket boats are patrolling rum row. Among them is the Sea Sleigh, a new type, capable of making 28 to 40 knots an hour. Aircraft will soon be used in her blockade. A seaplane, with fuel capacity for four hours flying at high speed, is being prepared at Squantum, Mass.

The present blockade, according to Lincoln C. Andrews, assistant secretary of the treasury, in charge of prohibition enforcement, is "only a minor engagement" and will be followed by a "real liquor warfare."

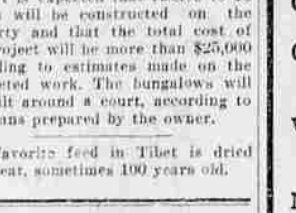
Memento Prizes To be Engraved
