

WALTER MALCOLM IS PRESIDENT OF OREGON STUDENTS

Walter Malcolm of Portland was elected to the presidency of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon in the annual election held yesterday. He defeated his opponent, Steele Winterer, by 326 votes. Approximately 1540 students voted which constituted the largest number of voters in any election held by the university students.

Edward Miller defeated Harold Kirk by an eight-point margin for the editorship of the Oregon Daily Emerald. Student publication, James Case and John Johnson divided minority of votes between them. Miller totaled 587, Kirk 579, Case 309 and Johnson 61 votes.

Freddie Martin, candidate for yell leader, Deloris Pearson, candidate for student body secretary and Elizabeth Cady, editor of the Oregonian were declared winners in their positions as they ran without competition.

Paul Ager easily defeated Bob McCabe for vice-presidency of the student body. He totaled 805 votes to 716 for McCabe.

Maurine Buchanan won the office of senior woman on the executive council by virtue of an 800 to 654 victory over Margaret Vincent. Bob Love defeated Ralph Kiep, 385 to 407 for position of junior man on the student council.

Carl Dahl, Dick Lyman and Floyd McKelton will fill the positions of senior men on the student council. Ellen McClellan and Jo Ann Warwick will serve as senior women on the council.

The new managerial system, which calls for undersecretaries for all athletic managers was voted an overwhelming victory.

The amendment to the Associated Student Body constitution which proposed the addition of a \$5 term fee for the building fund passed by a large majority. This fee will take the place of the pledges made yearly by the students which favors the building of a student union.

APPLICATIONS FOR LOANS ARE FILED

Four veterans of the Spanish war have filed application for the state soldiers' loan in Lane county so far and it is expected that a number of others will soon apply for the loan, according to Colonel J. M. Williams, Lane county attorney for the state bonus board. The new law whereby the Spanish war veterans are eligible for the state loan takes effect May 28 and preparations are being made for taking care of the new applications, the colonel states. Three veterans of the world war have already received the cash bonus have made application to return this and receive the loan instead, as provided by the new law. Five more applications for return of the cash bonus are being prepared. It is announced. The board of appraisers for Lane is composed of J. W. Hobbs, Lynn S. 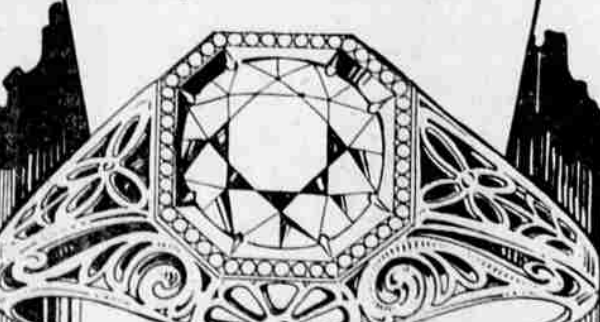
